COLUMBIA, a station in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the Kootenay branch of the C.P.R., 41 miles southwest of Cranbrook.

CURZON, a post office in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Davison station on the C.P.R. (Regina branch), 137 miles northwest of Regina.

CURZON VILLAGE, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Mtd. Pop. (1901), 101.

CUSHCOOLA, a bay on Lake Kenogami, at the mouth of the Baddely River, in Chicoutimi co., Que.

CUSHENDALL, a post office in Frontenac co., Ont., 7 miles from Rideau, on the G.T.R.

CUSHING, a post settlement in Argenteuil co., Que., on the Ottawa River, and a station on the Grenville & Carillon Ry., 4 miles from Staynerville on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Methodist), 1 store, saw, grist and planing mills, 1 cheese factory, and 1 telegraph office. Pop. of district, about 500.

CUSHMAN'S, a station in Northumberland co., N.B., on the Fredericton section of the I.C.R., 4 miles from Chatham Jct.

CUSTLETT, a post hamlet in the dist. of Placentia, Nfld., 24 miles from Placentia. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, and 1 store. Pop. 70.

CUT BANK, a post office in the Province of Alberta, 5 miles from Leavings on the C.P.R. (Calgary & Macleod div.), 94 miles south of Calgary.

CUTHBERT, a post settlement in Lambton co., Ont., near Eddy's Mills, a station on the Petrolia branch of the M.C.R.

CUTIATENDI LAKE, in the mountains of Fossebault, in Portneuf co., Que., is the source of the Riviere aux Pins.

CUT KNIFE, a post office in the Prov. of Saskatchewan. The place is identified with the fight at Cut Knife Hill with Poundmaker's Indian band during the Riel rebellion of 1885. The nearest station (about 30 miles dist.) is North Battleford, on the Can. Northern RR. (Edmonton div.), 47 miles north-west of Humboldt.

CUTLER, a post village and port on the North Channel of Lake Huron, in the Algoma dist. of Ontario, and a station on the C.P.R., 18 miles east of Algoma. It summer, there is daily communication by steamer from Cutler to Manitowaning, Little Current, and Spanish Mills. Adjoining the village is the Kenabutch Indian Reservation, with a church and Indian school. The village has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Anglican), 1 store, 1 saw mill, and express and telegraph offices. Pop. 400.

CYMBRIA, a post office in Queens co., P.E.I., near Hunter River station on the P.E. Island RR., 19 miles from Charlottetown.

CYPRESS, a post settlement in the Province of Saskatchewan, on Spruce Creek, 13 miles from Maple Creek, a station on the C.P.R., 64 miles east of Medicine Hat. Pop., about 100.

CYPRESS, a settlement in Algoma dist., Ont., with a station on the C.P.R. called Gurney, 89 miles from Port Arthur.

CYPRESS RIVER, a post office in Macdonald co., Man., and a station on the Souris section

of the C.P.R., 97 miles west of Winnipeg, and 54 miles east of Souris. It has 1 branch bank.

CIRVILLE, a settlement in Russell co., near the city of Ottawa, Ont. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store, and 1 hotel. Pop., about 250.

DAAQUAM RIVER takes its rise in Dorchester co., Que., and runs east through the rear of Lislet into the St. John River, in N.B.

DABLON, a village in Chicoutimi co., Que., 6 miles from Lac Bouchette, on the Quebec & Lake St. John Ry. It has 1 church, 5 stores, 1 hotel, and 5 lumber mills. Pop. 900.

DACOTA, a post office in Macdonald co., Man., and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 26 miles west of Winnipeg.

DACRE, a post settlement in Renfrew co., Ont., 12 miles from Douglas, a station on the C.P.R. and the Parry Sound and Ottawa branch of the G.T.R. It is 12 miles from Renfrew, and contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 2 hotels, 1 saw mill and 1 flour mill. Pop., about 500.

DAGERO, a station in Rainy River dist., northwest Ontario, on the C.P.R., 40 miles west of Kenora, on the Lake of the Woods, and 93 miles north-east of Winnipeg, Man.

DAIGLE, a farming settlement in Victoria co., N.B., on the St. John River, 4 miles from Grand Falls, on the C.P.R. It has 1 Roman Catholic church and 1 cheese factory. Pop. (chiefly French Canadian), about 400.

DAIRY VALLEY, a post office in the T'p. of St. George de Clarenceville, Missisquoi co., Que., 1½ miles from Clarenceville on the Quebec, Montreal and Southern Ry.

DALE, a post village in Kings co., N.S., on the North River, 8 miles from Cherryfield (Lunenburg), a station on the Halifax and South Western Ry. There is a pretty lake in the vicinity, called Spectacle Lake. Dale has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Episcopal), 2 stores, and 1 lumber mill. Pop. 55.

DALE, a post settlement in Durham co., Ont., 2½ miles from Port Hope, on the G.T.R. Pop. about 50.

DALESBORO, a post settlement in the district of Assiniboia East, Sask., 13 miles from Alameda, on the Lariovere section of the C.P.R.

DALESVILLE, a post village in Argenteuil co., Que., 5 miles from Staynerville, on C.P.R., and 45 miles from Montreal. It contains 1 Baptist church, grist and saw mills, 1 cheese factory and 1 general store.

DALESVILLE, a hamlet in Simcoe co., Ont., 6 miles from Tottenham, on the G.T.R.

DALHOUSIE, the name of a lake in Pictou co., N.S., on the John River.

DALHOUSE, the chief town of the co. of Restigouche, N.B., is situated on the right bank of the Restigouche River, at its entrance into the Bay of Chaleurs, 268 miles north of St. John, and 126 miles southeast of St. Flavie, on the St. Lawrence. In front of the town is a well-sheltered, crescent-shaped cove, with good holding ground for ships in 9 to 15 fathoms water. Fine wharves and excellent timber ponds have been constructed here, affording every convenience for loading the largest ships. The Restigouche and its branches drain at least 4,000 square miles of fertile country, abounding in timber and other valuable resources, the whole of which must find its way to the sea by the port of Dalhouse. A large trade is done in Dalhouse in

fresh salmon—exported in ice—and lobsters. A branch of the I.C.R. runs into the town. Sawm lumber from Metapedia district is shipped at wharves. It has, besides churches, stores, schools and public institutions, 3 shingle mills, a bank agency and 1 large lumber factory. Pop., about 1,000.

DALHOUSIE, a station on the Halifax and South Western Ry. in Annapolis co., N.S., 51 miles from Lunenburg, 22 miles from Middleton. The post office is called Stoddarts, which see for description.

DALHOUSIE EAST, a post village in Kings co., N.S., on the Lahave River, 7 miles from Cherryfield, on the Halifax and South-Western Ry. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Episcopal and Baptist), 2 stores, 2 hotels, and 2 saw mills. Pop. 330.

DALHOUSIE JUNCTION, a post settlement in Restigouche co., N.B., on the Restigouche River, and a station on the I.C.R., 7 miles from Dalhousie, and 9 miles east of Campbellton. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 hotel, and 2 shingle mills. Pop., about 125.

DALHOUSIE LAKE, a post settlement in Lanark co., Ont., on the Mississippi River, 7 miles from Snow Road Station, on the Kingston & Pembroke RR., 15 miles north of Sharbot Lake. It has 2 saw and grist mills, good water-power in the vicinity, and 1 telephone office. Pop. 12.

DALHOUSIE LAKE, in Algoma district, Ont. **DALHOUSIE MILLS**, a post village in Glengarry co., Ont., on the Dellisle River, 3 miles from Glen Robertson, on the Ottawa & Swanton div. of C. P. R., 2 miles from Dalhousie Mills Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store and 1 church. Pop. 75.

DALHOUSIE MILLS, a station of the C.P.R., 47 miles west of Montreal, in Soulanges co., Que. It contains 3 stores, 2 hotels, 1 bank (Union of Canada), besides telephone, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 200.

DALHOUSIE ROAD, a post settlement in Lunenburg co., N.S., 30 miles from Kentville, and 12 miles from Cherryfield Station, on Halifax & South Western Ry. It contains 2 churches (Roman Catholic and English), 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill, and 1 shingle mill. Pop. 175.

DALHOUSIE SETTLEMENT, a post settlement in Pictou co., N.S., 12 miles from Pictou, and near Scotsburn, on the I.C.R. Pop., about 300.

DALHOUSIE WEST, a post village in Annapolis co., N.S., 6 miles from Bridgetown, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry. It contains 3 churches (Methodist, Baptist and Episcopal), and 4 saw mills. Pop. 800.

DALIBAIRE, a post village in Rimouski co., Que., 80 miles from Rimouski, and 54 miles from Little Metis, on the I.C.R., the nearest railway point. It has 3 saw mills. Telegraph office is at Grand Mechins. Bank at Rimouski. Pop., about 500.

DALKEITH, a post village in Glengarry co., Ont., on DeGrassi River, and on G.T.R., 14 miles from Hawkesbury. It contains grist, saw, shingle and lath mills, 1 church, 2 stores, 1 cheese factory, and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 100.

DALLING, a post village in Shefford co., Que., 5 miles from Valcourt Station, on the Orford Mountain RR. It contains 2 churches

(Roman Catholic and Methodist), and 1 store. Pop., about 250.

DALMENY, a post settlement in Russell co., Ont., 6 miles from Orsmond Station, on the Ottawa & Prescott branch of the C.P.R. Mail once a day. It contains 1 store and 1 cheese factory.

DALMENY, a station on the Can. Northern RR., in Saskatchewan dist., Sask., 74 miles west of Humboldt, and 73 miles east of North Battleford.

DALNY, a station in Brandon co., Man., on the Lyleton section of the C.P.R., 22 miles from Deloraine, and 15 miles from Lyleton.

DALRYMPLE, a post office in Victoria co., Ont., on Mud Lake, 9 miles from Brechin, on the Midland div. of the G.T.R. It contains 4 churches, 1 store, and 1 pump factory. Dalrymple is becoming quite a summer resort; good fishing to be had from adjacent lake. Pop. 80.

DALRYMPLE, Assiniboia West, Sask. See Cupar.

DALSTON, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., 8 miles from Barrie on G.T.R. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Congregational), and 1 store. Pop. 150.

DALTON, a settlement in Algoma dist., northwest Ontario, and a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 46 miles west of Chapleau, between Lakes Windermere and Missinabi.

DALY, a lake in Montcalm co., Que. **DALY**, a post office in Brandon co., Man., 10 miles from Virden, a station on the C.P.R., 48 miles west of Brandon.

DAMASCUS, a post village in Wellington co., Ont., 8 miles from Arthur, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 2 stores, saw, shingle and chopping mills, and 1 wagon shop. Two establishments for making cement tile are in course of construction. Pop. 100.

DAMASCUS, a post settlement in Kings co., N.B., 16 miles from Nauwigewauk, on the I. C.R.

DAM CREEK, a post office in Algoma dist., Ont.

DANA, a post village in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a section on the Edmonton div. of the Can. Northern RR., 26 miles northwest of Humboldt. It is in a good wheat growing dist., well watered and with occasional bluffs of poplar, suited for ranching. It has 5 stores, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 60.

DANA STREAM, a river of New Brunswick, about 40 miles long, and furnishing good water power.

DANBY, a post settlement in Drummond co., Que., on the G.T.R. (St. Hyacinthe and Richmond div.), 15 miles west of Richmond. It has 1 Anglican church, also express and telegraph offices. Pop. 50.

DANESVILLE, a post office in Queens co., N.S., 2 miles from County Line on the Halifax and Southwestern Ry.

DANFORD LAKE, a post settlement in a farming region in Pontiac co., Que., 5 miles north of Kazubazua station, on the Gatineau River, in Wright co. It has 2 churches (Episcopal and Methodist), 1 general store, 1 saw and shingle mill, and express office at Kazubazua station. Situate on a lake, it is a desirable

place as a summer resort, in one or other of the nearby cottages. Pop., about 150.

DANFORD LAKE, a post village in Pontiac co., Que., on the Kazabazua River, 5 miles from Kazabazua, on the Maniwaki branch of C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), 1 store, 2 saw mills, and 1 schoolhouse. Pop. 200.

DANFORTH, a post village in York co., Ont., 1½ miles from Scarboro Junction, on the G.T.R., 9 miles east of Toronto. It contains 1 Methodist church, 2 stores, and 1 hotel. Pop. 100.

DANIEL, a post village in Queens co., N.B., 6 miles from Young's Cove Road, on the New Brunswick Coal and Ry. Co's line. It has 2 churches (Episcopal and Methodist), 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop. 50.

DANIEL PORT, a bay of Quebec, on the southwest side of the dist. of Gaspé, near the entrance to Baie des Chaleurs. It forms a snug inlet.

DANIELS, a station on the Salisbury & Harvey Ry., in Albert co., N.B., 38 miles south east of Salisbury, 7 miles from Albert.

DANIEL'S COVE, a fishing settlement in Bay-de-Verde dist., Nfld., on the south side of Trinity Bay, 4 miles from Old Perlican. Pop. (1901), 36.

DANIEL'S HARBOR, a fishing station on the French shore, Nfld., in the dist. of St. Barbe, 4 miles from Bonne Bay. Pop. (1901), 115.

DANIEL'S ISLAND, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 24.

DANIEL'S LAKE, a lake of Hants co., N.S. **DANISTON**, a post settlement in Russell co., Ont., on the Ottawa River, 6 miles from Cumberland, a calling point of the Ottawa River Nav. Co.'s steamers. It contains 1 store and 1 flour mill. A good deal of cheese is made in the district.

DANTE, a country post village in Kent co., Ont., on the stage route between Lambton and Kent counties, 3 miles from North Bothwell on the C.P.R. Pop., about 50 families.

DANTZICK COVE, a small fishing settlement in the district of Burin, Nfld., at the entrance to Fortune Bay (east side), 65 miles from Burin. Pop. 23.

DANVERS, a settlement in Marquette co., Man., on Rolling River, 19 miles from Clanwilliam Station, on the Canadian Northern Ry. A railroad is in course of construction, which, when completed, will probably give Danvers a station. It contains 1 Lutheran church, 1 hotel, and 1 small saw mill. Pop., about 165.

DANVERS, a post office in Digby co., N.S., 7 miles from Weymouth Bridge, on the Dom. Atlantic RR.

DANVILLE, an incorporated village beautifully situated in Richmond co., Que., on the G.T.R., 84 miles southwest of Quebec, and 87 miles northeast of Montreal. It contains 6 churches (Episcopal, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, Adventist and Congregational), telegraph and express offices, tannery, betting factory, cabinet factory, 2 saw and 2 grist mills, 3 carriage factories, 1 clothes pin and several butter and cheese factories, 1 large academy, 3 hotels, 10 stores and agencies of the Montreal and Eastern Townships banks. Pop. 1,017.

DANVILLE, a post office in Carleton co., N. B., near Newburgh Jct., on the C.P.R., 6 miles from Woodstock.

DARBY'S HARBOR (PLACENTIA SOUND), a settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 17.

D'ARCY, a post office in township of Howe Island, in Frontenac co., Ont., 5 miles from Findlay on the G.T.R. Pop. 50.

DARCYVILLE, a post office in Lanark co., Ont., 7 miles from Westport, on the Brockville, Westport & North-Western RR.

DARK COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Bonavista, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 171.

DARK TICKLE, a small fishing settlement in the district of Twillingate, Nfld., 25 miles from Tilt Cove. Pop. (1901), 91.

DARLING, a township in Lanark co., Ont., on the Clyde River, 14 miles from the C.P.R. There are five post-offices in this township. It contains 1 Presbyterian church and 2 stores. Pop. 780.

DARLING, a station on the Muskoka section of the C.P.R. in Muskoka dist., Ont., 4 miles from Bala Falls.

DARLINGFORD, a post office in Lisgar co., Man., and a station on the C.P.R., 8 miles from Manitow, on the La Riviere section of the line. It has a branch bank.

DARLING LAKE, a lake of Yarmouth co., N.S., which with the overflow of Allan's Lake empties into the Atlantic.

DARLING LAKE, in Kings co., N.B., at the mouth of Hammond River, communicates with the spacious estuary of the Kennebecasis.

DARLING LAKE, a post village in Yarmouth co., N.S., situated on a small lake near the sea shore, 10 miles from Yarmouth and 4 miles from Ohio, on the Dominion Atlantic RR. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 saw mill, 1 carding mill and 1 grist mill. The post office is known as Short Beach. Pop., about 75.

DARLING ROAD, a post office and station in Haldimand co., Ont., on the G.T.R. It contains 1 store, and 1 telegraph office. Pop. 50.

DARLINGTON, a station and post office on the G.T.R., in Durham co., 3 miles from Bowmanville, Ont., and 43 miles east of Toronto.

DARLINGTON, a post village in Queens co., P.E.I., 3¼ miles from North Willshire, a station on the Prince Edward Island Ry. Pop. 146.

DARNLEY, a post office in Prince co., P.E.I., 7 miles from Kensington, on the P. E. Island Ry., 39 miles from Charlottetown. There is a starch factory in the neighborhood.

DARRELL, a post village in Kent co., Ont., on the Erie & Huron div. of the Pere Marquette Ry., 5 miles from Chatham, the county seat. It contains 2 churches and 1 store. Pop., about 250.

DARREL'S HOME, a settlement in the dist. of Port-de-Grave, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 74.

D'ARTAGNAN, a post office in Levis co., Que., 1½ miles from St. Henri de Levis, a station on the Quebec Central RR.

DARTFORD, a post village in Northumberland co., Ont., 7 miles from Hastings, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store, saw and grist mills. Pop. 100.

DARTMOOR, a post village in Victoria co., Ont., 16 miles from Atherley, on the G.T.R. It has 1 Presbyterian church. Pop. 82.

DARTMOUTH, a seaport in Prince co., P.E.I., on Richmond Bay. Lat. 46° 33' N., lon. 63° 54' W.

DARTMOUTH, a post town and busy manufacturing centre in Halifax co., N.S., on the

Chebueto River, connected by ferry with Halifax city, and a station (the terminal on the east side of Halifax harbor) on the Dartmouth branch on the I.C.R., 12 miles south of Windsor Jct. It has 6 churches, of the various denominations, about 70 stores, 4 hotels, 2 bank agencies (Nova Scotia, and Union of Halifax), a number of schools, 1 large rope works employing about 300 hands, 1 skate manufactory, 1 sugar refinery, 1 cocoa and chocolate works, 1 rolling mill, 3 iron foundries, 1 boiler works, 1 machine and forge factory, 1 steel ship repairing yards, 2 corn mills, 1 brewery, besides an organ factory, molasses and soap manufactories, several saw mills, and a marine railway works, together with post, telephone, telegraph and express offices. It has an active Board of Trade. Pop., 5,000.

DARTVILLE, a post settlement in Colchester co., N.S., 3 miles from Brookfield, on the main line of the I.C.R. Its port is Short's Lake. It has saw and grist mills. Pop. 150.

DARVEAU, a post settlement in St. Nicholas parish, Levis co., Que., on the St. Lawrence River, and within a mile of three railway stations (St. Nicholas, Chaudiere, and Chaudiere Junction) on the Intercolonial and Grand Trunk RR. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 9 stores, 2 temperance hotels, 3 saw and flour mills, 1 sash and door factory, with a branch bank, and express and telegraph offices. Pop. of parish, 2,000.

DARWIN, a flag station on the C.P.R., in Selkirk co., Man., 7 miles east of Whitemouth and 68 miles east of Winnipeg.

DASHWOOD, a post village in Huron co., Ont., 8 miles from Exeter, on the London & Wingham branch of the G.T.R., 51 miles north of London. It contains 3 churches, 3 stores, 3 saw mills, 1 grist mill, 1 flax mill, 1 bank agency and 1 hotel. Pop., about 300.

DAUPHIN, a progressive post town and railway centre in Marquette co., Man., on the Vermilion River, near Lake Dauphin, and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 122 miles northwest of Portage la Prairie, and 178 miles from Winnipeg. It has 7 churches of the various denominations, 24 stores, 3 hotels and 6 hotel boarding houses, 2 harness and 3 blacksmith shops, 4 livery stables, 3 bank agencies, besides post, telegraph and express offices. Pop., over 2,000; of dist., about 15,000.

DAUPHIN, also called LITTLE SASKATCHEWAN, a beautiful rapid river of Man., runs into the west side of Lake Winnipeg.

DAUPHIN, a small stream in the Island of Orleans, on the St. Lawrence River, just below Quebec city, Que.

DAUPHINEY'S LAKE, a pretty lake on the borders of Lunenburg and Halifax cos., N.S., discharges its waters by Hubbert's River into the head of Margaret's Bay, an inlet of the Atlantic. It abounds with excellent fish.

DAUPHIN LAKE, a lake in Marquette co., Man. It receives the waters of the Rivers Fork, Drifting, Valley, and several others. It lies to the south of Lake Winnipegosis, and to the east of the line of the Can. Northern RR. It is 21 miles long by 12 wide at greatest breadth. It is very shallow and surrounded by fertile meadows. It has its outlet in Lake Winnipegosis, by the Dauphin River.

DAUPHIN RIVER, a stream frequented by

salmon on the south side of Anticosti Island, Gulf of St. Lawrence, Que.

D'AUTEUIL, a settlement in Arthabaska co., Que., 6½ miles from Kingsley Falls, in Drummond co. It has 2 saw and shingle mills. Pop. about 400.

DAVELUYVILLE, a post village in Arthabaska co., Que., on the Becancour River, and a station on the Intercolonial Ry., 32 miles east of Drummondville. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 6 stores, 2 hotels, 1 saw mill, 1 planing mill. Pop. 500.

DAVENPORT, a post settlement in York co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R. (Toronto and North Bay div.), 5 miles north of Toronto.

DAVID, a lake in Argenteuil co., Que., in the township of Montcalm.

DAVID, a lake in Berthier co., Que., in the township of Courcelles.

DAVID, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que., in the township of Dumais.

DAVID RIVER, of Chicoutimi co., Que., runs from the north and empties itself into the right bank of the Peribonca, 3½ miles from Lake St. John. It is navigable for canoes for a considerable distance.

DAVID or ST. DAVID RIVER, of Yamaska co., Que., is formed by the Ruisseau des Chenes and other small streams rising in the township of Upton. It falls into the Yamaska a little above Isle Joseph.

DAVID'S LAKE, Westmoreland co., N.B., noted for trout.

DAVIDSON, a post village in Humboldt dist., Prov. of Sask., 35 miles east of the Saskatchewan River, and a station on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 91 miles northwest of Regina. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 6 stores, 2 hotels, 1 chopping mill, 1 elevator, 1 sash and door factory, 1 bank agency, 1 printing and newspaper office, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 250.

DAVIDSON, a post settlement in Pontiac co., Que., and a station on the C.P.R. (Waltham branch), 10 miles from the latter station. It is on the Ottawa and Coulange Rivers. It has 1 general store and butcher shop, 1 hotel, and 1 shingle, lath and saw mill, with express office. Pop. 100.

DAVIDSON'S BAY, an inlet of Lake Rosseau, Muskoka dist., Ont.

DAVIDSON HILL, a post office in Ely Township, Shefford co., Que.

DAVIN, a farming and post settlement in Assiniboia dist., Saskatchewan Province, on Pile of Bones River, 12 miles from Balgonie, on the C.P.R., 17 miles from Qu'Appelle. It contains 1 Methodist church. Pop., about 400.

DAVIS, a post office in Kings and Albert cos., N.B., near Norton, the junction point of the New Brunswick Coal & Ry. Co's line with the I.C.R., 11 miles from Sussex.

DAVIS, a station on the Can. Northern RR. (Prince Albert div.), in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 9 miles east of Prince Albert.

DAVISBURG, a prosperous farming and post settlement in Alberta Province, on Bow River, 7 miles from DeWinton, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 bi-weekly mail, 1 school, also 1 Indian school, under the Dominion Indian department.

DAVIS' COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 45.

DAVIS' ISLAND, a settlement in the dist. of Burin, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 361.

DAVIS LAKE, a small lake on the borders of Queens and Shelburne cos., N.S., gives rise to the Jordan River, which empties into Jordan Bay, Shelburne co.

DAVIS LOCK, a port of call of the steamers of the Rideau Lakes Navigation Co., in Leeds co., Ont., 14 miles from Westport, 34 miles from Kingston, and 111 miles south west of Ottawa.

DAVIS MILLS, a post village in Renfrew co., Ont., on Indian River, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Locksley, a station on the G.T.R. (Pembroke and Golden Lake branch), 6 miles from Pembroke (on the C.P.R. and G.T.R.). The village contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), and 1 saw mill. Pop. 75.

DAVISON STREET, a post office in Kings co., N.S., near Wolfville, on the Dom. Atlantic RR.

DAVIS RIVER, in Argenteuil co., Que., is formed by the waters of several lakes in Chatham Gore, and runs south into the North River.

DAVIS RIVER, in Chicoutimi co., Que., runs from the west opposite Blueberry Plains into Commissioners Lake, adjoining Lake Bouchette, south of Lake St. John.

DAVIS' STRAIT, between Baffin Land, Franklin district of Canada and Danish Greenland, connects Baffin's Bay with the Atlantic. Length about 750 miles. The narrowest part of the strait is precisely at the point where it is intersected by the Arctic Circle, being there 220 miles broad, the widest being probably about 600 miles. The east coast is thickly strewn throughout its whole length with rocks and islets, and serrated with numerous narrow inlets which penetrate a good way into the land. The west coast has fewer, but larger indentations, the most extensive being Hudson Strait and Cumberland Sound. Strong currents set from it southward, and though greatly encumbered with ice it is much frequented by whaling ships. Named in honor of the celebrated navigator, John Davis, who discovered this strait in 1585.

DAVISVILLE, a suburb of Toronto, Ont., occupying the south part of the incorporated town of North Toronto. It is situated $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the city of Toronto and connected therewith by the Metropolitan Street RR. Besides the local post office, there are grocery and feed stores, an agricultural implement and stove store, 2 harness shops, 1 pottery, and several green houses. These are also 1 Methodist church and an undenominational mission, and a public school. Pop. within its limits 900; or, including the nearby villages of Eglington and Bedford Park, 3,000.

DAWN MILLS, a post village in Kent co., Ont., 4 miles from Dresden, on the Pere Marquette RR. It contains 2 churches, and 1 store. Pop., about 100.

DAWN VALLEY, country post village in Lambton co., Ont., 4 miles from Dresden, on the Pere Marquette Ry. It has 1 Methodist church.

DAWSON, a post village in Russell co., Ont., $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Osgoode Station, on the St. Lawrence and Ottawa branch of the C.P.R. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store and 1 cheese factory. Pop. 100.

DAWSON, a lake in Champlain co., Que.

DAWSON, a post settlement in Albert co., N.B., $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from Stoney Creek, on the Salisbury & Harvey Ry. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 2 mills and 1 manganese refining factory. This district is purely agricultural. Pop., about 200.

DAWSON BAY, an inlet of Lake Winnipegosis, on the borders between Manitoba and Saskatchewan Prov.

DAWSON CITY, a flourishing town in the Yukon district, built up by the gold industry of the Klondike. It is situated at the junction of the Yukon and Klondike Rivers, 360 miles from White Horse, a port of entry on the southern borders of the Yukon. It has 4 churches (Roman Catholic, Episcopal, Presbyterian and Methodist), 47 stores, 12 hotels, 3 saw and planing mills, 2 bicycle machine factories, 2 banks, 2 printing and newspaper offices ("Dawson News" and "Yukon World"), with express and telegraph offices. Pop. (census 1901), 9,142.

DAWSON, MOUNT, B.C. (11,113 feet in height), an elevated peak in one of the ranges of the Rockies, in West Kootenay dist., B.C., near Glacier.

DAWSON SETTLEMENT, a post office in Kings and Albert co., N.B., near Steevescote, on the Salisbury & Harvey RR.

DAWSON'S COVE, a small fishing and farming settlement in the district of Fortune Bay, Nfld., on Connaigre Bay, 6 miles from Harbor Breton. It has 1 lobster cannery. Pop. (1901), 89.

DAWSON'S LAKE, a small lake in Chatham and Gore townships, Argenteuil co., Que.

DAWSONVILLE, a thriving post village in Restigouche co., N.B., on the Restigouche River, 6 miles from Metapedia, on the I.C.R. and Atlantic & Lake Superior Ry. It contains 5 churches (Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist), 36 stores, 8 hotels, 1 grist and 4 saw mills, 1 bank, newspaper, telegraph and express offices. Campbellton is its port. It is a great salmon fishing centre.

DAWTON, York co., Ont. See Emery.

DAY MILLS, a post settlement in Algoma co., Ont., 4 miles from Dayton, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 store, grist and saw mills. Basswood Falls, here, are 80 feet high. A canoe route has been opened from the main line of the C.P.R., down the Missisauga River, to Basswood Lake. Pop. 40.

DAYSLAND, a thriving settlement in Strathcona dist., Province of Alberta, a fine farming region, well supplied with water, and with coal in the district. It is a station on the Wetaskiwin branch of the C.P.R., 51 miles east of Wetaskiwin, on the Calgary & Edmonton div., 152 miles north of Calgary. It has 3 churches (Episcopal, Presbyterian and Methodist), 14 stores, 3 hotels, 1 flour and feed mill, 1 bank (Merchants of Can.), 1 printing and newspaper office ("Day Star"), besides post, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 625.

DAVSPRING, a post village in Lunenburg co., N.S., on the La Have River, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Bridgewater, on the Halifax & South Western Ry. It contains 3 churches, 3 stores, 1 graded school, 3 shipbuilding yards, lumber, lath and

shingle, and grist mills and a telephone office. Pop. 362.

DAYTON, a post settlement in Yarmouth co., N.S., 2 miles from Hebron, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry. It has 9 stores, 1 cheese and butter factory, and a hall in which meetings are held. Pop. 100.

DAYTON, a post office and station in Algoma dist., Ont., on the C.P.R. (Upper Ottawa and Sault Ste. Marie branch), 12 miles from Thessalon, and 26 miles west of Algoma Mills, on the North Channel of Lake Superior. Pop. 60.

DEACON, a post settlement in Renfrew co., Ont., on the Bonnechere River, 6 miles from Parry Sound, on the Ottawa & Parry Sound div. of G.T.R., and on the Canadian Northern Ontario Ry. Its port is Golden Lake. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Methodist and Presbyterian), 4 stores, 2 hotels, 1 saw mill, 1 sash and door factory, 1 butter factory, and 1 express office.

DEADFALL POINT, a settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 11.

DEADMAN'S BAY, a small fishing settlement in the district of Pogo, Nfld., 18 miles from Greenspond. It has an Episcopal church. Pop. (1901), 26.

DEADMAN'S BIGHT, a settlement in the dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 31.

DEADMAN'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 19.

DEADMAN'S HARBOR, a small fishing settlement in Charlotte co., N.B., 10 miles from St. George, on the Bay of Fundy, 7 miles from Penfield, on the N. B. Southern Ry. It contains 1 small store. Pop., 4 families.

DEAD MOOSE LAKE, a post settlement in Prov. of Saskatchewan, 10 miles from Humboldt, on C.N.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church and 1 store. Pop. 6.

DEADWOOD, a post office in the Kettle River region, Yale dist., B.C., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Greenwood Station, on the C.P.R., 23 miles west of Grand Forks.

DEALTOWN, a hamlet in Kent co., Ont., 12 miles from Blenheim. It has 1 church and 1 hotel. Pop. under 100.

DEAN, a post village in Halifax co., N.S., on the Musquodoboit River, 25 miles from Brookfield, on the I.C.R., 8 miles from Truro.

DEAN, or SALMON RIVER, in Bella Coola mining dist., B.C., north of Bella Coola River, which empties into Burke Channel. The Salmon River flows into Dean Channel, an inlet of the Pacific, north of Burke Channel, in Milbank Sound.

DEAN AND CHAPTER, a small lake on the borders of Hants and Lunenburg counties, N.S., near the head waters of the Gold River.

DEAN LAKE (formerly THOMPSON), a post village in Algoma district, Ont., and a station on the C.P.R., called Dean Lake. It is situate on the North Channel of Lake Huron, on the "Soo" branch of the C.P.R., 17 miles west of Algoma Mills. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill and 1 blacksmith shop, besides express and telegraph offices. Pop. 150.

DEANS, a post office in Haldimand co., Ont., on the Grand River, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Cayuga, a station on the G.T.R. and Michigan Central Ry., 31 miles west of Welland.

DEASE, or SALMON RIVER, rises in the north eastern part of the Coast district, B.C., flows a westerly course and empties into Dease Lake. It receives the waters of the Takia, a small stream at Salmon Head.

DEASE LAKE, in the northern part of British Columbia, in lat. 59°, over 200 miles east of Juneau city and the Pacific coast, or 80 miles from the head of navigation on Stickeen River. It is fed by numerous small streams, and is drained by Dease's River which falls into Liard's River, and which in turn loses itself in Mackenzie River. The face of the country is rolling hills and prairie land. Enormously rich gold-fields were discovered in July, 1873, in the vicinity of this lake.

DEASE RIVER, in the Mackenzie district of the Northwest Territories, rising in the Coppermine Mountains and flowing into the north side of Great Bear Lake. Named, as well as the following strait, after Lieut. Dease, one of the party that first explored it in 1837, by order of the Hudson Bay Company.

DEASE STRAIT, a channel in the Arctic waters of the Franklin district of Canada, communicating with Coronation Gulf and having Melbourne Island at its east extremity; intersected by the parallel of 69° N. It is about 120 miles long and 23 miles average breadth, and at its widest part is considerably obstructed by islands.

DEATH RIVER, or ONEPOWE, a small river in Selkirk co., Man., enters the left bank of the Red River, near Fort Garry. It has received this gloomy name from the circumstance that 250 lodges of Chippewas are said to have been destroyed here by the Dacotahs over 100 years ago.

DE BAY COVE, a post office in Halifax co., N.S., *via* Halifax.

DEBEC, a post village in Carleton co., N.B., and a station on the Houlton & Debec Jct. branch of the C.P.R., 12 miles from Woodstock, and 8 miles from Houlton, Me. It contains 2 hotels, 6 stores, and 1 saw mill. Pop., about 250.

DEBEC JUNC., a station at the junction of the Edmundston and Houlton branches of the C.P.R., in Carleton co., N.B., 12 miles from Woodstock.

DEBERT, a river of Colchester co., N.S., rises in the Cobequid Mountains and flowing south falls into Cobequid Bay. Several lakes at its source abound with speckled trout.

DEBERT, a post village in Colchester co., N.S., on the river of the same name, with a station on the I.C.R., 11 miles from Truro. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores, 2 saw mills, and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 400.

DE BLOIS, a station and farming settlement and post office on the Prince Edward Island Ry., in Prince co., P.E.I., $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Tignish. Pop. 200.

Tignish. Pop. 200.

DECEPTION, a station in Rainy River dist., northwest Ontario, on the C.P.R., 19 miles west of Rat Portage (Kenora), on the Lake of the Woods.

DE CEWSVILLE, a post village in Haldimand co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 3 miles from Cayuga. It contains 2 churches, 1 saw mill, 1 grist mill, 1 hotel, and 1 store. Pop. 150.

DE CLARE, a post settlement in Marquette co., Man., 5 miles from Macauley, a station on

the Pheasant Hills branch of the C.P.R., 17 miles from Kirkella.

DE COY LAKE, a small lake in the township of Clarendon, Pontiac co., Que.

DEDISH, or DUPEY'S CORNER, a post village in Westmoreland co., N.B., on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, 10 miles from Shediac, a station on the Point du Chene branch of the I.C.R., 16 miles from Moncton. It has 2 stores and 1 hotel. Pop., about 300.

DEEBANK, a small village in Muskoka co., Ont., on River Dee, 16 miles from Uttersen, and 20 miles from Bracebridge on G.T.R. Pop., about 25.

DEEMERTON, a post settlement in Bruce co., Ont., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Mildmay Station, on the G.T.R., 16 miles north of Harriston. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church and convent, 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 cider, jelly and syrup factory, and long distance telephone service. Pop. 125.

DEEP BAY, an inlet in Leeds co., Ont., in which there is good fishing.

DEEP BIGHT, a settlement in the dist. of Trinity, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 39.

DEEP BROOK, a post settlement in Annapolis co., N.S., on Annapolis Basin and a station on the Dominion Atlantic Ry., Western Counties branch. It contains 2 churches (Episcopal and Baptist), 3 stores, 5 boarding houses, saw, carding and grist mills, 1 carriage factory, 1 furniture factory and telephone office. Pop. 500.

DEEP COVE, a beautiful inlet in Lunenburg co., N.S., surrounded by charming mountain scenery. Some of these mountains are 800 feet high, and rise perpendicularly from the shore of the lake. The spot is visited regularly by tourists, and is universally admired. The cove affords good trout fishing and the mountains game.

DEEP COVE, a post office in Cape Breton co., N.S.

DEEP COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Piacentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 27.

DEEP CREEK, a station on the Edmundston branch of the C.P.R., in Carleton co., N.B., 10 miles from Woodstock.

DEEPDALE, a post settlement in Inverness co., N.S., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Inverness, on the Inverness & Richmond RR. It contains 2 stores and saw and coarding mills. Pop. 145.

DEEPDALE, a station on the Canadian Northern RR., in Marquette co., Man., 78 miles west of Dauphin.

DEEP RIVER, of Quebec, runs south-west into Lake Quaaquamack.

DEEP RIVER, or RIVIERE CRBUSE, is that part of the Ottawa River, between Les Deux Joachims and Mattawa, 143 miles above Ottawa city,—a stretch of 28 miles of apparently motionless water, very wide and of great depth. On the south side of this grand sheet of water the general conformation of the country is that of an elevated and comparatively level plateau; the prevailing character of the soil being dry and sandy, the forests nearly altogether of red pine and white birch. On the north side very bold mountainous scenery prevails; all that can be seen of the country in that direction as one passes down the river is harsh and barren. The syenitic rocks frequently tower up to immense heights above the deep water.

DEEP ROCK LAKE, Man., a small lake which rises in Macdonald co., near Lake Winnipegosis and flows into Lake Manitoba. It lies to the northeast of Dauphin Lake.

DEERBROOK, a post village in Essex co., Ont., on the Ruscumb River, with port on Lake St. Clair, close to St. Clair Station, on the G. T.R., 5 miles from Belle River. It has 1 hotel. Pop., about 25.

DEERDOCK, a village in Addington co., Ont., 33 miles from Perth on the C.P.R. See Oso Station.

DEERFIELD, a post office in Yarmouth co., N.S., 4 miles from Ohio, a station on the Dom. Atlantic RR.

DEER HARBOR, a small fishing settlement in the district of Trinity, Nfld., on Random Island, 10 miles from New Bonaventure. Pop. (1901), 80.

DEERHURST, a post office in Simcoe co., Ont., $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Gilford, and 5 miles from Bradford on G.T.R. It has 1 Methodist church and 1 store. Pop. 10.

DEER ISLAND, a small island in the district of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld., 12 miles from Burgeo. Pop. (1901), 66.

DEER ISLAND, an island of New Brunswick, in Passamaquoddy Bay, near its entrance, on the southwest side, about 9 miles long and 5 miles broad. It contains 7 settlements, 2 lakes, and also some dangerous whirlpools. It is a port of entry, and has several churches, 14 stores and 2 saw mills. It is settled by farmers and fishermen. Pop., about 1,500.

DEER ISLAND, in the district of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 66.

DEER ISLAND, one of a group of islands in the district of Bonavista, Nfld., 7 miles from Greenspond. Pop. under 100.

DEE RIVER, Simcoe co., Ont.

DEER LAKE, a station on the Montfort division of the Quebec and Lake St. John Ry., in Argenteuil co., Que., 1 mile from Montfort, and 12 miles from Montfort Jet.

DEER LAKE, a station near a lake of the name on the Reid-Nfld. RR. (Bishop's Falls section), 10 miles west of Grand Lake, and 29 miles north of Bay of Islands, Nfld. It is in the dist. of St. George. Pop. (1901), 57.

DEER LAKE, a small lake in Muskoka dist., Ont., abounding with salmon trout, bass and pickerel. It forms the southern part of Pigeon Lake north of Pine Lake, and a few miles northwest of Muskoka Wharf Station, on the G.T.R.

DEER LAKE, in the Athabaska dist., of the Northwest Territories. See Reindeer Lake.

DEER LAKE, a post village in Haliburton co., Ont., on the Pawdash Creek (a tributary of the Trent River), 3 miles from Deer Lake Station on the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa RR. There are good mineral indications in the vicinity, as well as good fishing and shooting, and excellent water-power. The village has an Anglican church, 1 hotel, 1 steam saw mill, post office, and telephone service. Pop. 80.

DEER LAKE, a small lake in Haliburton Ont., abounding with trout.

DEER LAKE, a station on the C.P.R., 6 miles south of Canterbury, in York co., N.B., 59 miles from St. Andrews. Large quantities of lumber are shipped from here, a saw mill being in operation about six months in each year.

DEER LAKE, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 57.

DEER LAKE, a small body of water near the Lake of the Woods, in Rainy River dist., W. Ontario. Area, 4,240 acres.

DEER LAKE, in Hugel t'p., Nipissing dist., No. Ont., lying north of Veuve and south of Sturgeon Rivers, and 5 miles north east of Warren Station, on the C.P.R.

DEER LAKE STATION, a station on the Irondale, Bancroft & Ottawa Ry., in Haliburton co., Ont., 10 miles from Bancroft, 40 miles from Kinmount Jct.

DEER LODGE, a post settlement in Humboldt dist., Sask., near Red Deer, a station on the Calgary & Edmonton branch of the C.P.R.

DEER PARK, a suburb of Toronto, York co., Ont., $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile from North Toronto Station on the C.P.R., connected with the Ontario capital by a 15 minutes' service on the Metropolitan Street RR. It has 2 churches (Episcopal and Presbyterian), 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 hospital (for nervous diseases), 1 public and 1 Roman Catholic separate school, 1 tombstone and monument workshop, and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., about 900.

DEER PARK, a post office in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the Columbia River, 16 miles by steamer from Robson, with port on Lower Arrow Lake, 20 miles from Castlegar, on the C.P.R. Farming and fruit raising are the occupations of the settlement. Pop. 20.

DEER POND, a beautiful lake of Newfoundland, about 15 miles long by 3 miles wide. It is an expansion of the River Humber, and is surrounded by land of a most fertile description, bearing on its surface great quantities of pine and birch.

DEER'S LAKE. Man., has its source in Keewatin district, N.W.T. It receives the waters of several rivers and small lakes which have no names.

DEERVILLE, a post settlement in Carleton co., N.B., 10 miles from Hartland, on the C.P.R. Pop. 57.

DEERWOOD, a post office in Macdonald co., Man., and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 10 miles east of Somerset and 49 miles west of Morris.

DEE SIDE, a post settlement in Bonaventure co., Que., on the Restigouche River, 7 miles from Metapedia Station, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Methodist church. It is noted for its salmon fishing. Pop., about 50.

DE GRASSI POINT, a post settlement in Simcoe co., Ont., on Lake Simcoe, 2 miles from Lefroy Station, on the Toronto & North Bay branch of the G.T.R., 11 miles south of Allandale, and 52 miles north of Toronto.

DE GRATS, a fishing station on the French Shore, Nfld., on Quirpon Island, 2 miles from Quirpon. Pop. 8.

DE GROS MARSH, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., on the Cardigan river, 6 miles from Cardigan on the P.E.I. Ry. It contains 1 church, 1 store, 1 saw mill, 3 lobster canneries and 1 express office. Its port is Newport. Pop. 240.

DE LA BAIE, a lake in Argenteuil co., Que., in the township of Wolfe.

DE LA BELLE TRUITE, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

DE LA DECHARGE, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que., in the township of St. Germain.

DELAGRAVE, a post office in Montmagny co., Que., $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from St. Pierre station, on the I.C.R., 5 miles from Montmagny.

DE LA GROSSE TRUITE, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que., in the township of Callieres.

DE LA HAUTEUR, a lake in Quebec co., Que.

DELAMARRE, a post settlement in Megantic co., Que., 6 miles from Lyster, on the G.T.R., and Lotbiniere & Megantic Ry.

DE LA MONTAGNE BRULEE, a lake in Quebec co., Que.

DE LA MONTAGNE TREMBLANTE, a lake in Labelle co., Que., in the township of Joly.

DE LA PLUIE, a lake in Quebec co., Que.

DELAPS COVE, a post settlement in Annapolis co., N.S., 6 miles from Granville Ferry Station on the Halifax & South Western RR. (Port Wade branch). It has 1 church (Adventists), 1 general store, and 1 lumber mill. Pop. 150.

DE LA RIVIERE A POLETTE, a lake in Saguenay dist., Que.

DE LA ROUGE, a lake in Argenteuil co., Que., in the township of Wolfe.

DE LA SOURIS, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

DE LA TRUITE, a lake of Terrebonne co., Que., noted for trout fishing.

DELAWARE, a thriving post village in Middlesex co., Ont., on the River Thames, and 3 miles from Komoka Station, on the G.T.R. (southern div.), 3 miles from Mt. Brydges Station, and 14 miles from St. Thomas. It contains 3 churches, 1 cider mill, 1 grist mill, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 telegraph and express office. The South Western Traction Co. has constructed its road to within six miles of Delaware, and is expecting to build to Delaware shortly and erect a power-house, thus connecting Delaware with London, St. Thomas and Port Stanley by electric road. Pop. 350.

DELBY'S COVE, a small fishing station in the district of Trinity, Nfld., at the entrance to Smith's Sound, 6 miles from New Bonaventure. Mails twice a week. Pop. (1901), 30.

DEMORFSTVILLE, a post settlement in Prince Edward co., Ont., 9 miles from Picton, on the Central Ontario Ry. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Methodist), 4 stores, 1 hotel, 1 grist mill, 1 apple evaporator and several hop yards, telegraph, express and telephone offices. Pop. 250.

DEVLIN ROAD, a post office in Rainy River dist., northwest Ontario, and a station on the Can. Northern RR., 42 miles east of Rainy River.

DEVON, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., 1½ miles from Windsor Junction, on the I.C.R. and Dom. Atlantic Ry. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 hotel and 1 shingle mill. Pop. 50.

DEWAR, a settlement in Pictou co., N.S., 1 mile from Avondale on the I.C.R.

DEWDNEY, a post settlement in Alberta Province, on Sheep Creek, a short distance from Okotoks Station, on the C.P.R. (Calgary and Macleod branch). It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 hotel, and 1 saw mill. Pop. 225.

DEWDNEY, a post and farming settlement in New Westminster dist., B.C., on the Fraser River, and a flag station on the C.P.R., 48 miles east of Vancouver. It has a service hall for the chief denominations of the place (Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist), and 1 general store. Farm produce, with milk and cream shipped daily to Vancouver, are the chief exports. Pop. 250.

DE WET, a station on La Riviere section of the C.P.R., in Provencher co., Man., 8 miles from Morris, and 6 miles from Rosenfeld.

DE WINTON, a post settlement in the Prov. of Alberta, a station on the C.P.R. (south branch of the Calgary and Edmonton div.), 19 miles south of Calgary, and 89 miles north of Macleod. It has 1 general store, and has a good farming region tributary to it. Pop. 30.

DEWIS, a settlement in Hants co., N.S., 2 miles from Milford on the I.C.R.

DE WITTE, a station on the White Pass & Yukon Ry., in the Yukon, 83 miles from Skagway, Alaska, 27 miles from White Horse.

DEWITTVILLE, a thriving post village in Huntingdon co., Que., on the Chateauguay River and G.T.R., 45 miles south of Montreal. It possesses good water-power privileges, and contains 1 church, 1 store, saw, grist and woollen mills, and 3 factories. It is the centre of a fine farming country, and has good fishing and boating. Pop. 200.

DE WOLFE, a post settlement in Charlotte co., N.B., 3 miles north from Moore's Mills, on the C.P.R., 8 miles from St. Stephen. It con-

tains 1 Union church, 2 stores and 1 black-smith shop. Pop. 150.

DEXADEASH LAKE, in Yukon Terr., situate to the westward of White Horse Pass, the entrance of the Territory from Northern British Columbia.

DEXTER, a station on the C.P.R., in Thunder bay dist., northwest Ontario, 57 miles north west of Port Arthur, at the head of Lake Superior.

DEXTER, a post village in Elgin co., Ont., on Sampson Creek, 5 miles from Port Stanley, on the London & Port Stanley branch of the Lake Erie & Detroit RR. Its port is Erie. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 store, 1 chopping mill, and 1 barrel factory, school, hall and black-smith shop. Pop. about 50.

DIAMOND, a post village in Carleton co., Ont., on Carp River, 2½ miles from Kinburn, on the Ottawa division of the G.T.R., the nearest railway station. It contains 2 churches.

DIAMOND, a post and farming settlement in Pictou co., N.S., on the east branch of the River John, 10 miles from Scotsburn, a station on the Oxford and Pictou branch of the I.C.R. River John is its port. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 hotel, saw, grist and shingle mills, 1 store and several schools. Pop. 500.

DIAMOND, or NON-WA-KAMING LAKE, lying to the north west of Lady Evelyn Lake, in the Temagami Forest Reserve region, Nipissing dist., Northern Ontario.

DIANA, a post settlement in Strathcona dist., Alberta Prov., on Pipestone Creek, 46 miles from Wetaskiwin, a station on the C.P.R. It contains 1 store, 1 boarding-house and 1 lumber yard. Pop. 14.

DIBLEE, a station on the C.P.R., in Carleton co., N.B., and a station on the Edmundston branch of the C.P.R., 5 miles from Woodstock.

DICKENSON, a settlement in Russell co., Ont., 4 miles from Vars Station, on the Ottawa division of the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 cheese factory.

DICKENSON'S LANDING, a thriving post village in Stormont co., Ont., on the left bank of the St. Lawrence, at the head of the Cornwall Canal, 77 miles southwest of Montreal. It contains 1 church, 2 stores, 1 public school, and 1 telephone office. A ferry crosses the river from here to Messina, N.Y. The Grand Trunk has a station 1 mile back of the town. It is called Wales. Pop. 200.

DICKEY, a lake in Champlain co., Que.

DICKSON, a post office in Strathcona dist., Prov. of Alberta, 17 miles from Innisfall on the Calgary and Edmonton branch of the C.P.R.

DICKSON'S STORE, Colechester, N.S. See East New Annan.

DIDGEGUASH RIVER, takes its rise in the south-west extremity of York co., N.B., flows south-east and falls into Passamaquoddy Bay, about 12 miles from St. Andrews. Length 45 miles. There are a number of saw mills on this river which annually manufacture a large quantity of lumber. Its banks are heavily wooded.

DIDSBURY, an incorporated village in the Province of Alberta and a station on the Calgary and Edmonton branch of the C.P.R., 43 miles from Calgary. It contains 4 churches (Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and 2 Lutheran), 4 stores, 1 hotel, 1 sash and door factory, 1 branch of the Union Bank, and 1 printing

office issuing a weekly newspaper. Pop. 350
DIEPPE, a post office in St. John and Iberville cos., Que., near St. Alexander, on the Central Vermont RR.

DIGBY, a post town in Digby co., N.S., on Digby Basin (Annapolis Bay), and a station on the Dominion Atlantic R.R., 67 miles northeast of Yarmouth, and 20 miles southwest of Annapolis Royal. Digby is the chief town of Digby co., N.S., and is noted for its shipbuilding and manufacturing industries. It has 5 churches of the various denominations, about 25 stores, 4 hotels, 2 banks (agencies of the Nova Scotia and Union Bank of Halifax), 1 printing and newspaper office ("Courier," weekly), 2 wood-working and 2 carriage factories, cuff and canvas goods, and box and barrel factories, 5 manufactories of cured fish, linnan haddies, etc., and 1 of canned fruits, vegetables, etc., also 1 yacht designer and builder, besides schools, post, telephone, telegraph and express offices. Pop., 1,250.

DIGBY, a county in the west southwest extremity of Nova Scotia, bordering on the Atlantic Briar's Island, and a remarkable headland called Digby Neck encloses St. Mary's Bay on the northwest. The surface is extremely diversified with mountains, valleys and lakes, the last of which give rise to several considerable rivers. Copper and silver ores are found in the county. The underlying rocks consist of different colored sandstones of the coal measures. The county is served by the Dom. Atlantic R.R. Area, 640,000 acres. Capital, Digby. Pop. in 1891, 19,897; and in 1901, 20,322.

DIGBY, a small settlement in Carleton co., N.B., 1½ miles from Good Corner. Pop. 40.

DIGBY BASIN, Digby co., N.S., is noted for mackerel and herring fishing. The tide rises and falls 27 feet in the basin.

DIGBY GUT, Digby co., N.S. See Bay View.

DIGBY NECK, a settlement in Digby co., N.S., on the Bay of Fundy, 5 miles by water and 20 miles by land from Digby, on the Dominion Atlantic Ry.

DILDO COVE, a fishing settlement at the head of Trinity Bay, Nfld., in an inlet or harbor at the mouth of which is an island, on which there is a large fish and lobster hatching factory, 3 miles from Broad Cove, on the Whitbourne and Carbonear branch of the Reid-Nud. RR.; it is 10 miles north of Whitbourne. Pop. of Dildo (1901), 425.

DILIGENT RIVER, a post settlement in Cumberland co., N.S., on the Rowanshead River, 8 miles from Parrsboro' Station, on the Cumberland Ry. It contains 4 churches (Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Episcopal), 2 stores, 1 lumber mill. Pop., about 750.

DILIGENT RIVER, a small stream in Cumberland co., N.S., empties into Minas Channel, an inlet of the Bay of Fundy. Affords good salmon fishing.

DILLON PORT, a post office in Parry Sound dist., Ont., 22 miles from Parry Sound on the Ottawa div. of G.T.R. and on the Can. Northern Ontario Ry.

DILONTON, a post and mining village in Bromie co., Que., on a branch of the Missisquoi River, 3 miles from Eastman, on the C.P.R. & Orford Mountain Ry., 18 miles from Montreal. The Huntingdon copper mines are situated here. Pop., under 75.

DILTZ, a station on the G.T.R., in Haldimand co., Ont., 14 miles from Cayuga.

DIMOCK (formerly WENTWORTH CREEK), a settlement in Hants co., N.S., on a tributary of the Avon River. In the vicinity are gypsum quarries, the product of which is largely shipped to the U.S. Pop., about 300.

DINGLEY, a station on the Transcontinental line of the C.P.R., in Saskatchewan dist., Sask., 6 miles west of Indian Head.

DINGWALL, a fishing and farming settlement in Cape North dist. of Victoria co., N.S., at the head of Aspy Bay, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, 90 miles from the I.C.R. station of North Sydney. It has 1 Roman Catholic church and 1 general store, besides the Government telegraph office, post office, 1 school and 1 lobster cannery. Pop. 110.

DINGWELL'S MILLS, a post office in Kings co., P.E.I., 9 miles from Souris, a station on the P.E. Island RR., 60 miles north east of Charlottetown.

DINORWIE, a post settlement in the dist. of Algoma, Ont., on Lake Wabigoon, and a station on the C.P.R., 100 miles east of Kenora. It contains 1 Episcopal church, 1 store, 1 hotel and 1 school. Pop. 200.

DINWOODIE, a post settlement in Strathcona dist., Alta. Lavo, on the Edmonton line of the C.N.R. is the nearest railway station.

DIPPER HARBOR, a post village in St. John co., N.B., on the Bay of Fundy, and 7 miles from Lepreaux, on the N. B. Southern Ry. It contains 2 churches, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop., under 200.

DIPPER HARBOR, WEST, a post office in St. John co., N.B., 9 miles from Musquash, on the N.B. Southern RR.

DIRLETON, a post office in Carleton co., Ont., 8 miles from Galetta, a station on the Ottawa & Parry Sound div. of the G.T.R., 5 miles from Arnprior and 33 miles from Ottawa.

DISCOVERY, a settlement in B.C., on the Pine Creek, 60 miles from Carcross. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 4 stores, 6 hotels, and 1 saw and lumber mill. Pop. 200.

DISCOVERY PASS, in the Strait of Georgia, B.C., a narrow passage between Valdez and Thurlow Islands and Comax dist., Vancouver Island.

DISLEY, a post office in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 29 miles northwest of Regina.

D'ISRAELI, a post settlement in Wolfe co., Que., and a station on the Quebec Central Ry. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church and convent, 12 stores, 2 hotels, 2 lumber mills, 1 sash and door factory, 1 box factory, telegraph and express offices, and a branch of La Banque Provinciale. Pop. 1,300.

DISTRESS, a river of Ontario in the Parry Sound dist., rises in lat. 45° 44' 39" N., and runs south into the Magnetawan. Very extensive flats exist on each side of this river, thickly clothed with evergreens, chiefly balsam, spruce and white pine; tamarac also occurs occasionally, and in some parts there is an almost impervious growth of alders and vines. The soil consists of sand resting in dark colored clay.

DITCHFIELD, a station on the C.P.R. (short line), in Beauce co., Que., 6 miles from Lake Megantic.

DITTON RIVER, a small stream in Compton co., Que.

DIVER, a station in Osborne township, Nipissing dist., N. Ont., on the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario RR., 18 miles south of Bushnell, and 40 miles north of North Bay.

DIXIE, a station on the G.T.R. in Jacques Cartier co., Que., 1 mile from Lachine.

DIXIE, a post village in Peel co., Ont., on the C.P.R., 1 mile from Cooksville. It contains 3 churches (Episcopal, Baptist and Presbyterian), 1 store, and 1 hotel. Pop. 300.

DIXON, a post office in Queens co., N.B., near Young's Cove, a station on the N. B. Coal & Ry. Co.'s line.

DIXON, a post village in Stormont co., Ont., 7 miles from Wales, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 cheese factory, 1 Baptist church and a blacksmith shop. Pop. 50.

DIXON ENTRANCE, a waterway from the Pacific, opposite Port Simpson, B.C., at the head of Hecla Strait, between Queen Charlotte Islands and the B. C. mainland.

DIXON'S CORNERS, a post settlement in Dundas co., Ont., on the St. Lawrence River, 7 miles from Iroquois Station on the G.T.R. It has 3 churches (Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and Anglican), 4 stores and 1 cheese and butter factory. Pop. 80.

DIXON'S POINT, a hamlet in Kent co., N.B., near Buctouche, on the Buctouche & Moncton Ry.

DIXVILLE, an incorporated village in Stanstead co., Que., on the Coaticook River, on the G.T.R., 27 miles from Sherbrooke. It has 3 churches, 3 stores, saw and grist mills, 1 hotel, 1 branch bank, telephone and telegraph offices. Pop. 430.

DOAK, a station on the C.P.R., in York co., N.B., 4 miles from Fredericton.

DOAKTOWN, a post settlement in Northumberland co., N.B., on southwest Miramichi River, and on the Fredericton and Chatham section of the I.C.R., 64 miles from Fredericton. It contains 4 churches, 6 stores, 3 hotels, saw, grist, clapboard and carding mills, sash, door and furniture factories, telegraph and express offices. Pop., under 1,000.

DOBBINTON, a post settlement in Bruce co., Ont., and a station on the G.T.R. It contains 3 churches (Methodist, Presbyterian and Mennonite), 3 stores, 1 grist mill, 1 sash, door and lath factory, and express office. Pop. 160.

DOBSON'S CORNER, a post settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., on the North River, 10 miles from Petitcodiac. It contains 1 Methodist church. Pop. 129.

DOCK, a settlement in the dist. of Port-de-Grave, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 152.

DOCKS ROAD, a settlement in Prince co., P.E.I., 2 miles from Bloomfield, on the P. E. I. Ry. It has Roman Catholic and Protestant churches, 2 stores, 1 grist and 2 saw mills, and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 100.

DOCTOR'S BROOK, a post office and village in Antigonish co., N.S., 15 miles from Antigonish, on I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, saw and grist mills, and 2 lobster canneries. Pop., under 100.

DOCTOR'S COVE, a post village in Shelburne co., N.S., 6 miles from Barrington Head. It has 1 store, and 1 Baptist church. The inhabitants are principally engaged in sea fishing and lobstering. Pop. 225.

DOCTOR'S HARBOR, a small farming settle-

ment in the district of Fortune Bay, Nfld., 15 miles from Belieorem. Pop. (1901), 37.

DODDRIDGE, a station in Hants co., N.S., on the Midland div. of the Dominion Atlantic RR., 5 miles northeast of Kennetcook Corners and 8 miles southwest of South Maitland.

DOE, a lake in Parry Sound dist., Ontario, on the Magnetawan River. It is about 5 miles long; near it there is an abundance of hemlock with white and red pine, also hills clothed chiefly with hardwood. It lies west of Emsdale, a station on the Toronto & North Bay div. of the G.T.R., 8 miles south of Burk's Falls.

DOE LAKE, a post village in Parry Sound dist., Ont., adjoining a lake of the same name, $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Sprucedale, on the Ottawa division of the G.T.R. and near Emsdale, on the Toronto & North Bay div. of G.T.R. The scenery around it is very beautiful; good fishing is found on the lakes. It has 3 churches (Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodist). Pop. 163.

DOG BAY, a small fishing settlement in the district of Fogo, Nfld., the west side of St. Mary's Bay, 9 miles from Salmonder, 40 miles from Lewisport, a station on the Reid-Nfld. Ry. Pop. (1901), 15.

DOG BAY WEST, a small fishing settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 78.

DOG CE (BAY DE VIEUX), a settlement in the dist. of Burgeo and La Poile, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 19.

DOG CREEK, a post office in Dauphin (Marquette) co., Man., near Reaburn, on the C.P.R.

DOG CREEK, in the Yale and Cariboo dist., B.C. It has 1 post and express office, 3 general stores and 1 hotel. Nearest telegraph office, Clinton; stage weekly from Ashcroft, the nearest railroad station, distance 132 miles. The principal industry is stock-raising. Pop., about 50.

DOG LAKE, in Algoma dist., northwest Ontario, situate to the west of Lake Missinaibi.

DOG LAKE, a large sheet of water in the district of Thunder Bay, Northwest Ont., 24 miles northeast of Lake Superior. It is of an irregular V shape, the apex, at which the outlet occurs, being pointed to the southwest. From this outlet one arm stretches northeast 15 miles, while the other extends east 18 miles. The breadth of the body of the lake, between the junction of the two arms and the outlet, is from 2 to 4 miles. The banks of Dog Lake are densely wooded. Dog River flows into it from the west. It has its outlet in the Kaministiquia River, which empties into Lake Superior, near Michipicoten and Port Arthur.

DOG LAKE, Man. Lat. 51° N., and between the 98° and 99° W. lon. It is in Selkirk co., and its waters drain into Lake Manitoba, opposite the outlet of Ebb and Flow Lake. Area, 41,000 acres.

DOG POUND, a post office in Calgary dist., Prov. of Alberta, near Cochrane station, on the main line of the C.P.R., 22 miles west of Calgary.

DOG RIVER, a stream in the Algoma dist., northwest Ontario, flowing into Michipicoten Harbor.

DOG TOOTH LAKE, one of a small group of lakes in Rainy River dist., Ont., adjoining the Lake of the Woods.

DOHENAGAMOOK LAKE, a lake of Temiscouata co., Que., good for trout fishing.

DOHERTY, a post settlement in Sunbury co., N.B., on Salmon Creek, 8 miles from Chipman, on the N. B. Coal & RR. Company's Ry.

DOHERTY, a flag station in Nipissing dist., Ont., on the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario RR., 8 miles south of Temagami, and 64 miles north of North Bay, the terminus of the G.T.R. (North Bay div.), 226 miles north of Toronto, and a divisional point on the main line of the C.P.R., 24 miles northwest of Ottawa.

DOHERTY'S MILLS, a village in Kent co., N.B., 2 miles from St. Anthony, a station of the Moncton and Buctouche Ry., and on the southwest branch of the St. Nicholas River. Pop., under 200.

DOLBEAU SACRE CŒUR, a post settlement in Chicoutimi and Saguenay co., Que., 75 miles from Chicoutimi, on the Lake St. John Ry. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church. Pop., about 700.

DOLLAIR, a settlement in Kent co., N.B., 3 miles from Upper Buctouche, near St. Anthony, on the Moncton & Buctouche RR. Pop., about 150.

DOLLAR, a post office in York co., Ont., 4 miles from Unionville, on the Midland division of the G.T.R., 20 miles northeast of Toronto. Pop., under 60.

DOLLAR LAKE, in southeast Algoma dist., northwest Ontario, situate northwest of Massey Station, on the Soo branch of the C.P.R.

DOMAINE DE GENTILLY, a settlement in Nicolet co., Que., 4 miles from Nicolet, on the I.C.R.

DOMAINE, RIVIERE DU, rises in 2 lakes in rear of Cap Tourmente, Montmorency co., Que., at least 800 feet above the level of the St. Lawrence, into which it falls.

DOMINION, a station on the G.T.R., in Jacques Cartier co., Que., within the limits of the town of Lachine, between Convent and Rockfield.

DOMINION, a station on the Maine Central Ry., in Compton co., Que., 2 miles from Marbleton, and 16 miles from Cookshire Jct.

DOMINION, NOS. 4 & 6, so-called from a colliery situated here, a post village in Cape Breton, N.S., on the Sydney & Louisburg Ry. It contains 3 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist and Anglican), 8 stores, 2 hotels, 1 bank agency, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 2,500.

DOMINION CITY, a post settlement in Provencher co., Man., on the Rousseau River, and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 3 churches (Episcopal, Presbyterian and Methodist), 3 stores, 3 implement warehouses, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill, 4 elevators, 1 branch bank, school and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 400.

DOMINION CREEK a post settlement in the mining region of the Yukon dist., 35 miles from Dawson, and connected therewith by daily stage. It is situate on a stream which empties into the Indian River. The nearest railway station (about 400 miles distant) is White Horse, a short road which runs northward from Dyea and Skagway. It has 1 Methodist church, 3 stores, and 3 hotels. Pop. 600 in winter, and 900 in summer.

DOMINIONVILLE, a post village in Glenarry co., Ont., at the head of River De Lisie, 12 miles from Alexandria, the county seat, and 2 miles from Mayville, the nearest railway and banking point, 44 miles from Ottawa. It con-

tains 1 church, 1 saw mill, 1 store and 1 hotel. Pop. 210.

DOMINO, a port of call of the Reid-Newfoundland steamers (Labrador line), 539 miles from St. John's, Nfld.

DOMREMY, a post settlement in the Province of Saskatchewan, 25 miles from Duck Lake, on the Prince Albert div. of the C.P.R. and 16 miles from Birch Hills, on the C.N.R. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store, blacksmith and carpenter shops and public school. Pop. 500.

DOMVILLE, a post settlement in Grenville co., Ont., 4 miles from Prescott Station, on the G.T.R. and C.P.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 cheese factory. Pop., under 150.

DON, a post office in York co., Ont., east of Toronto. See Riverside.

DONALD, a settlement in Yale co., B.C., on the Columbia River and a station on the C.P.R., 458 miles east of Vancouver. It contains telegraph and express offices. Pop. 22.

DONALDS, a settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., a few miles from Moncton on the I.C.R.

DONALDSON, a post office in Frontenac co., Ont., 3 miles from Wilbur, a station on the Kingston & Pembroke RR.

DONALDSON, a post office in Queens co., P. E. I., 3 miles from Bedford, a station on the P. E. Island RR., 13 miles north east of Charlottetown.

DONALDSON LAKE, a small lake in Wright co., Que.

DONBOUR ISLES, three small islets in the River St. Lawrence, between St. Augustine and Pointe aux Trembles, Portneuf co., Que.

DONCASTER, a post office and lumber village in Compton co., Que., on the Clifton River, 2 miles from the Clifton Station of the Maine Central RR., 30 miles from Sherbrooke, and 20 miles from the International boundary. It has 1 general store and 1 saw mill. Pop. 500.

DONCASTER, or TODMORDEN CHESTER, a post village in York co., Ont., 3 miles from Toronto. It has 4 stores, 3 paper mills, 2 pressed brick and terra cotta factories, chemical works, pickle factory, carriage works; 4 churches and 1 hotel. Pop., under 100.

DONEGAL, a post settlement in Kings co., N.B., on the Cedar Camp River, 12 miles from Sussex Station, on the I.C.R., 45 miles north-east of St. John. It has 1 Maritime Baptist church. Pop., under 50.

DONEGAL, a post settlement in Perth co., Ont., 4½ miles from Atwood, on the G.T.R., 6 miles from Listowel. It contains 1 store, 1 Methodist church, 1 mill, cheese factory, and printing office. Pop., 45.

DONGOLA, a post village in Victoria co., Ont., 5½ miles from Kinmount, on the G.T.R., 33 miles north of Lindsay. It has 1 Methodist church. Pop. 126.

DONGOLA, a post office in Assiniboia dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Millwood, a station on the northwestern branch of the C.P.R., 8 miles from Binscarth. The district contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian).

DONKIN MOUNT, B.C. (9,694 feet in height).

DONNYBROOK, a post settlement in Pictou co., N.S., and on the Upper West River, 12 miles from James River, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 2 stores, and 2 mills. Pop. 40.

DONORE, a settlement in Lisgar co., Man., 3 miles from Shanawan, on the C.P.R. The district contains 1 Anglican church. Pop. 200.

DONOVAN'S, a station on the Reid-Nfld. RR., 7 miles west of St. John's, and 3 miles east of Irvine, on the St. John's section of the line.

DON VALLEY, a post office in York co., Ont., and a station on the Toronto Belt line, 3½ miles east of Toronto. Pop., about 150.

DOON, a post village in Waterloo co., Ont., on the Grand River, and on a branch of the G.T.R., 6 miles from Berlin. It has 4 churches, 2 stores, 1 hotel, glue, twine, woollen stock, brick and tile factories, and express and telegraph offices. Pop. 600.

DORA, a small post settlement in Strathcona electoral dist., in the Prov. of Alberta, 20 miles from Stettler, on the Lacombe branch of the C.P.R., on the surveyed extension line of the Can. Northern RR. It has 1 general store, 1 hotel and 1 lumber yard. Pop., under 50.

DORAN LAKE, a small lake in Liverpool township, Queens co., N.S., near Mill Village; has its outlet in Port Medway River.

DORCHESTER, or DORCHESTER STATION, a post village on the River Thames, in Middlesex co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 10 miles from London. It has 3 churches (Episcopal, Presbyterian and Methodist), telegraph, express and Bell telephone offices, flour, saw and planing mills, cheese and mattress factories, 2 hotels, 6 stores, and branch of Bank of Toronto and peat plant factory. Pop. 600.

DORCHESTER, the shire town of Westmoreland co., N.B., on the Memramcook River, and a station on the I.C.R., 12 miles from Sackville, and 21 miles from Amherst. It contains 5 churches (Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Anglican and Roman Catholic), 7 stores, 1 hotel, 1 branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, telegraph and express offices, the county court house and goal, the Maritime Penitentiary, and several lodges and societies. It is a seaport town. Pop. 6,200.

DORCHESTER, a county in the eastern part of the Province of Quebec, extending from Levis co., on the northwest, to the State of Maine on the southeast. The Etchemin River runs through this county. Area, 602,624 acres. Chief town, St. Henedine. Pop. of co. (1901). 21,007.

DORCHESTER CROSSING, a post office in Westmoreland co., N.B., on the I.C.R. (Point du Chene branch), 4 miles from Shediac. The railway station is called Dorchester Road.

DORCHESTER ROAD, a station on the I.C.R. (Point du Chene branch), 12 miles from Moncton.

DOREE LAKE, a small lake in Renfrew co., Ont.

DORE LAKE, a lake of Labelle co., Que., well stocked with fish.

DORE LAKE, west of Montreal Lake, in the northern section of the Prov. of Saskatchewan. Area, 155,000 acres.

DORENICE, a post office in Strathcona dist., Prov. of Alberta, near Wetaskiwin, on the Calgary & Edmonton div. of the C.P.R., 40 miles south of Edmonton.

DORE RIVER, a stream in Algoma dist., northwest Ontario, falling into Michipicoten Bay, on the east shore of Lake Superior. Copper is found on its banks.

DORION, a post village in the district of

Thunder Bay, Ont., on the C.P.R. There are 2 post offices (Quimet and Broadcroft). Sturgeon fishing is extensively carried on here as an industry. It has 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 1 saw mill and 1 express office. Pop. 140.

DORKING, a post settlement in Wellington, Perth and Waterloo cos., Ont., 10 miles from Newton, on the Georgian Bay and Lake Huron div. of the G.T.R. It contains 1 church, 1 school, 1 store, 1 hotel, and 1 wagon shop. Pop. 80.

DORLAND, a post village in Lennox co., Ont., at the head of Carnahan Bay, 15 miles from Napanee, on the G.T.R., the county seat and nearest railway and banking point. It has 1 cheese factory and 1 store. Pop. under 100.

DORNOCK, a post settlement in Grey co., Ont., 9 miles from Durham. It contains 2 churches, 1 store, and 1 hotel. Pop. 20.

DORN RIDGE, a post settlement in York co., N.B., $\frac{3}{4}$ miles from Cardigan Station, on the C.P.R. St. John is its port. It contains 1 Christian church, 1 general store and blacksmith shop. Pop. 120.

DORR, a station on the Great Northern Ry., in Kootenay dist., B.C., 42 miles from Fernie on the Crows Nest branch of the C.P.R.

DORSET, a post settlement and summer resort on the border line between the district of Muskoka and Haliburton co., Ont., on Trading Lake, 30 miles from Bracebridge, and 26 miles east of Huntsville. It contains 2 stores, 2 hotels, 1 saw mill, 3 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist and Anglican, school house and town hall, and 1 telegraph office. Pop. 140.

DORVAL, a post village in Jacques Cartier co., Que., on Lake St. Louis, 1 mile from Dorval station, on the G.T.R. and C.P.R. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Protestant), 1 general store, 1 hotel, 1 coal and wood merchant, 1 blacksmith shop, and 1 carriage factory, besides express and telegraph offices. Pop., 900.

DORVAL, a small stream on the Island of Montreal, Que., runs south in a very irregular course and falls into Lake St. Louis, opposite Isle Dorval, Jacques Cartier co.

DORVAL, ISLE, an island at the mouth of the River Becancour, 1 mile north of Becancour Village, Nicolet co., Que.

DORVAL STATION, a post office in Jacques Cartier co., Que., and a station on the G.T.R. and C.P.R., 10 miles from Montreal. It contains 2 churches (Episcopal and Roman Catholic), 1 store, and 1 hotel. Pop. 481.

DOT, a station on the Nicola branch of the C.P.R., in Yale-Cariboo district, B.C., 20 miles from Spence's Bridge Jct., on the main line C.P.R., 27 miles from Nicola.

DOTING COVE, a fishing and farming settlement in the dist. of Fogo, Nfld., 35 miles from Greenspond, and 30 miles from Fogo Harbor, on the north-east section of the island colony. Pop., about 400.

DOUBLE, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

DOUBLE ISLAND, a port of call of the Labrador line of the Reid-Newfoundland steamers, Nfld., 100 miles from its northern terminus, 928 miles north of St. John's.

DOUCET'S LANDING, a port on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, with ferry to Three Rivers opposite, in Nicolet co., Que. (post office name, Ste. Angele de Laval), and a station on the Three Rivers branch of the G.T.R., 35

miles north of Victoriaville (Arthabaska), 32 miles east of Richmond.

DOUCETTEVILLE, a post office in Digby co., N.S., $\frac{5}{8}$ miles from North Range, a station on the Dom. Atlantic RR.

DOUGHERTY, a station on the C.P.R. (St. Andrews branch), in Charlotte co., N.B., 7 miles from St. Andrews.

DOUGLAS, a village in Hants co., N.S., 14 miles from Newport, on the Dom. Atlantic RR. Pop., about 75.

DOUGLAS, a post settlement in Brandon co., Man., a station on the C.P.R., 11 miles east of Brandon. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Methodist), 4 stores, 2 temperance hotels, with express and telegraph offices. Pop. 300.

DOUGLAS, a station on the Great Northern Ry. in New Westminster dist., B.C., 24 miles from New Westminster, 1 mile from Blaine in Washington Territory.

DOUGLAS, a post village in Renfrew co., Ont., on the north bank of Bonnechere River and on the Ottawa, Arnprior & Parry Sound Ry., 12 miles from Cobden, and on northwest branch of the C.P.R. It possesses good water power, and contains 3 churches, express and telegraph offices, grist and saw mills, 3 hotels, 1 bank and 4 stores. Pop., about 400.

DOUGLAS, a post settlement in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, 1 mile from Springhill, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Free Baptist church, 1 store, and 1 wagon factory. Pop. 600.

DOUGLAS, a station on the P.E.I. Ry., in Kings co., P.E.I., 25 miles east of Charlottetown.

DOUGLAS, a post village in Brandon co., Man., and a station on the Winnipeg and Brandon div. of the C.P.R., 11 miles northeast of Brandon.

DOUGLASBURG, a post office in Napierville co., Que., 2 miles from Napierville, on the Napierville Junction Ry.

DOUGLAS CHANNEL, an inlet of the Pacific from Hecate Strait into Skeena dist., B.C., northwest of Hawkesbury Island and Gardner Channel. Kitimat Arm is at its furthest inland extremity, Kildala Arm opening out of it on the southeast.

DOUGLASFIELD, a post settlement in Northumberland co., N.B., 3 miles from Chatham, on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R. It has 1 store. Pop. 350.

DOUGLAS FORT, in the Prov. of Manitoba, is near the confluence of the Assiniboine and Red Rivers.

DOUGLAS HARBOUR, a lumber and fishing settlement in Queens co., N.B., on the west side of Grand Lake, 14 miles from Minto Station or (preferably) Waasis, on the Fredericton branch of the C.P.R., 10 miles south of Fredericton. It has 1 Episcopal church, 2 stores and 1 saw mill. The place is an ideal one for hunting, fishing and yachting. Pop., about 100.

DOUGLAS LAKE, a post hamlet in Yale and water in Kent co., N.B., the resort of tourists and summer residents. Plenty of trout are found in it.

DOUGLAS LAKE, a post hamlet in Yale and Cariboo dist., B.C. The nearest station is Kamloops (60 miles), on the main line of the C.P.R., 250 miles northeast of Vancouver. It has 1 store. Pop. 50.

DOUGLSTON, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 12 miles from Alameda Station, on the C.P.R. (Napinka and Estevan division). It has 4 churches (Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and Lutheran), and 1 general store. Pop. 85.

DOUGLSTOWN, a post village in Northumberland co., N.B., on the Miramichi River, 4 miles from Newcastle, on the I.C.R. It contains 2 churches (Presbyterian and Roman Catholic), 6 stores, 1 hotel and 2 lumber mills. Pop. 600.

DOUGLSTOWN, a post village in Gaspé co., Que., at the mouth of the River St. John, a noted salmon stream, 9 miles from Gaspé Basin. Its inhabitants are chiefly engaged in the fishery. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, and a well sheltered harbor. Telegraph office. Bank at Paspébiac, on the Atlantic & Lake Superior RR. Pop. of township (1901), 1,098.

DOUGLAS VALLEY ROAD, or **CLARENDON STATION**, a settlement in Queens co., N.B., on the C.P.R., 6 miles from Enniskillen, and 29 miles from St. John. Pop. 150.

DOUGLAS WEST, a post village in Gaspé co., Que., 80 miles from New Carlisle, on the Atlantic Quebec and Western Ry. Pop. 273.

DOURO, a post village in Peterboro' co., Ont., 5 miles north of the C.P.R. station of Indian River, 9 miles east of Peterboro'. It has a large Roman Catholic church, 2 stores, and 1 grist mill, besides 1 telephone office, and at Indian River Station express and telegraph offices. Pop., about 100.

DOVER, a post settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., on the Petitcodiac River, 6 miles from Memramcook, and 10 miles from Moncton, on the I.C.R. It has Methodist and Baptist churches and a number of oil wells. Pop. 200.

DOVER CENTRE, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., 11 miles from Chatham, the county seat, and 9 miles from Wallaceburg, on the Erie & Huron branch of the Pere Marquette Ry., its nearest railway and banking point. It contains 1 store and 1 saw mill.

DOVERCOURT, a post office in York co., Ont., near Parkdale, a suburb of Toronto.

DOVER HILL, a post village in Victoria co., N.B., 3 miles from Kilburn Station, on the C.P.R., 7 miles from Perth Jct. It contains 1 hotel. Pop., under 100.

DOVER SOUTH, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., 6 miles from Chatham, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 2 stores, 2 hotels, and 1 saw mill. Pop. 150.

DOVER WEST, a post office in Halifax co., N.S., 3 miles from Peggy's Cove, 3⁰ miles from Halifax. Pop., under 100.

DOWNEY'S COVE, a small settlement on an inlet of Chignecto Bay, in Cumberland co., N.S. It receives its mails from Minuidé.

DOWNEYVILLE, a post village in Victoria co., Ont., 5½ miles from the G.T.R. station at Omamee, and 8 miles from Lindsay. The C.P.R. station at Dunsford is 6 miles distant. The village has 1 Roman Catholic church, and good separate school, 1 general store, 1 cheese factory (3 miles east), and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., about 80.

DOWNEYVILLE, a post office in Kings and Albert cos., N.B., 10 miles from Hampton, a station on the I.C.R., 11 miles from Sussex.

DOWNSVIEW, a post village in York co., Ont., on the Toronto and North Bay div. of the G.T.R., 8 miles from Toronto. It has 1 Methodist church, and 1 store. Pop. 190.

DOW SETTLEMENT, a village in York co., N.B., 5 miles from the C.P.R. station of Canterbury, 22 miles north of McAdam Jct. It has 1 United Baptist church. Pop. 125.

DOYLE, a post office in Pontiac co., Que., 25 miles from Pembroke, on the C.P.R. and G.T.R., and 12 miles from Sheenboro.

DOYLE SETTLEMENT, a post village in Restigouche co., N.B., 5 miles from Jacquet River Station, on the I.C.R., 28 miles northwest of Bathurst. Pop. 150.

DOYLE'S, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., 3 miles from Charing Cross Station, on the Michigan Central Ry. Pop., under 400.

DOYLE'S BROOK, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., near Coughlan (Grey Rapids station), on the Canada Eastern RR.

DOYLE'S STATION, a settlement in St. George's dist., Nfld., in the southwest section of the island, on the Great Codroy River, with a station (Doyle's) on the Reid-Nfld. RR., 25 miles north of Port-aux-Basques. It has 1 general store, 1 hotel, 1 post office, with telegraph and express facilities. Pop. 30.

DOZOIS, a post office in Napierville co., Que., 4 miles from Girard on the Rouses Point branch of the G.T.R.

DRACON, a post hamlet in the township of Garafraza, Wellington co., Ont. It is an agricultural district situated on the Irvine River, a tributary of the Grand River, and 5 miles from Belwood, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church.

DRAG, a small lake in Peterborough co., Ont.

DRAGON BAY, a whale fishing station on the south coast of Nfld., in the district of Burgeo and La Poile, at the entrance of Hermitage Bay, 16 miles from Hermitage Cove. It has 1 lobster cannery.

DRAPER LAKE, a lake of Frontenac co., Ont., well stocked with various kinds of fish.

DRAYTON, a thriving incorporated village in Wellington co., Ont., on the G.T.R., Wellington, Grey and Bruce division, and on the Conestogo River, 30 miles from Guelph. It contains a telegraph office, a branch of the Traders Bank of Canada, 1 printing office issuing weekly newspaper, grist and saw mills, 27 stores, 3 hotels, and Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and Christ churches, and Salvation Army barracks, tile and brick yards and shoe and legging factory. Pop. 791.

DRESDEN, an incorporated town in Kent co., Ont., on the River Sydenham, and on the Pere Marquette Ry. It contains hub and spoke factory, wheel factory, canning factory, evaporating factory, 1 roller flour mill, 1 flour mill, sash and door factory, planing factory, 2 bank agencies and carriage and wagon factory. Pop., 1,850.

DREW, a post office 2 miles from Drew Station on the G.T.R. in Wellington co., Ont.

DREW'S MILLS, Stanstead co., Que. See Baldwin's Mills.

DREW STATION (formerly SMITHURST), on the Stratford and Wlarton branch of the G.T.R., in Wellington co., Ont., 5 miles north of

Harriston. The place is noted for its brick yards. Pop., under 100.

DRIFTING RIVER, rises in Marquette co., Man., and flows into Lake Dauphin, south of Lake Winnipegosis.

DRIFTWOOD RIVER, a stream which rises south of Bear Lake, in Omineca dist., B.C., and flows into North Tacla Lake at Bulkley.

DRINKWATER, a post office in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Portal section of the C.P.R., 19 miles from Moose Jaw, on the main line. It has 1 branch bank.

DROKE, a settlement in the dist. of Burin, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 12.

DROMORE, a post village in Grey co., Ont., 9 miles from Holstein Station, on the G.T.R. It has 1 Presbyterian church, shingle, lath, chopping, planing and saw mills, 1 store, and telephone exchange. Pop. 100.

DROMORE, a post settlement in Queens co., P.E.I., 4 miles northeast of Pisquid, a station on the Georgetown and Mt. Stewart Jct. branch of the P. E. Island R.R., 3 miles southeast of Mount Stewart. Farming and dairying are the chief industries of the place. Pop. 150.

DROMORE WEST, a post village in Queen's co., P.E.I., on the Hillsboro' River (with port thereon), 3 miles from Pisquid, a station on the Georgetown R.R., near to Mt. Stewart. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, 1 flour mill, 1 lumber mill, with express and telegraph offices at Mt. Stewart. Pop. 200.

DROOK, a settlement in the dist. of Placentia and St. Mary's, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 32.

DRUM, a village in Durham co., Ont., 2 miles from Pontypool, a station on the C.P.R., 22 miles southwest of Peterboro.

DRUMAGUE, a small settlement in Qu'Appelle dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, on Pheasant Creek. It expects to have a station (about 2 miles distant), on the projected line of the Grand Trunk Pacific R.R.

DRUMBO, a post village of Oxford co., Ont., on the G.T.R. and C.P.R., 23 miles from Stratford. It contains 4 churches, telegraph and express offices, 1 planing mill, 7 stores, 2 hotels, 1 large grain elevator, 1 bank agency and printing office. Pop. 500.

DRUMHEAD, a post settlement in Guys-boro co., N.S., 50 miles from Antigonish, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Baptist church, 1 store, and 1 fish cannery. Pop. 100

DRUMMOND and **ARTHABASKA**, a county of the Province of Quebec, in the interior, comprising an area of 877,408 acres. The St. Francis River passes through this county. Chief town, Drummondville. Pop. in 1901, 44,484.

DRUMMOND, a post village in Victoria co., N.B., along the Tobique River, 6 miles from Grand Falls Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Baptist and Methodist), and 2 lumber mills.

DRUMMOND, a post office in Lanark co., Ont., 7 miles from Perth, on the C.P.R.

DRUMMOND'S a station on the G.T.R. (Peterboro' and Belleville branch), 6 miles from Peterboro'. Ont.

DRUMMONDVILLE, an incorporated town in Drummond co., Que., on the St. Francis River, having two railway stations, that of the I.C.R. and C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Anglican), several stores, 4 hotels, lumber, shingle, grist, woollen and saw mills, 2 foundries and 1 smelting works, 2 branch

banks and express and telegraph offices. Drummondville, according to the first Church of England register, was founded 22nd June, 1815, and it was settled by soldiers disbanded after the war of 1812. Pop. 1,450.

DRUMMONDVILLE WEST, Welland co., Ont. See Niagara Falls.

DRUMQUIN, a post village in Halton co., Ont., on Sixteen Mile Creek, 3 miles from Hornby Station, on the C.P.R., and 8 miles from Oakville, on the G.T.R. It contains 1 agricultural implement factory, 1 large apiary, 1 store and 1 Methodist church. Pop. 40.

DRURYS, a settlement in St. John co., N.B., near the city of St. John.

DRYDEN, a post village in Wellington co., Ont. See Palmerston.

DRYDEN, a post office in Rainy River dist., northwest Ontario, and a station on the C.P.R., 63 miles northwest of Ignace and 17 miles east of Eagle River.

DRY FORK, a post office in the Prov. of Alberta, near Pincher Creek station, on the C.P.R., 29 miles west of Macleod.

DRYNOCK, a station in Yale dist., B.C., on the main line of the C.P.R., 15 miles northeast of Lytton.

DRY RIVER, a post settlement in Lisgar (Souris) co., Man., 4 miles from Mariapolis, a station on the C.N.R.

DRYSDALE, a post village in Huron co., Ont., on Lake Huron, 10 miles from Kippen, a station on the G.T.R. (London & Wingham branch), 10 miles from Clinton Jct. It has 2 churches, 1 general store and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop., about 75.

DUAGH, a post office in Edmonton dist., Alberta Province, 10 miles from Fort Saskatchewan, on the Can. Northern lines.

DUART, a post village in Kent co., Ont., 1½ miles from Muir Kirk, on the Michigan Central and Pere Marquette Rys. It has a good trade in lumber, staves and country produce, and contains 3 churches, 1 saw mill, 2 stores, 1 pump and wind mill factory, 1 hotel, 1 public library, and telephone office. Pop. 200.

DUBAUNT, a river in Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., north of Athabaska and west of Keewatin districts.

DUBAUNT LAKE, a body of water in the eastern portion of Mackenzie dist., N.W.T., southwest of Aberdeen Lake. Area 1,058,400 acres.

DUBLIN, a post settlement in Perth co., Ont., on the Bayfield River, and a station on the G.T.R., 18 miles northwest of Stratford, and 15 miles south-east of Clinton. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Methodist and Anglican), 5 stores, 2 hotels, 1 lumber mill, 1 bank agency and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 300.

DUBLIN'S COVE, a port of call on the Placentia and Port aux Basques line of the Rivd-Newfoundland steamers, 24 miles from Port aux Basques.

DUBLIN SHORE, a post village in Lunenburg co., N.S., on the La Have River, 14 miles from Bridgewater, on the Halifax and South Western Ry. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Presbyterian), 4 stores, 2 hotels, and 1 lobster cannery. Pop., 500.

DU BONNET LAKE, Man., a lake in Selkirk co., the rivers of L'Osseau and Winnipeg flow

through this lake, and have their outlet in Lake Winnipeg.

DUBREUIL, a post office in Renfrew co., Ont., near Ashdod, a station on the K. & P. Ry.

DUBUC, a post settlement in Assa. E., Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Pheasant Hills branch of the C.P.R., 81 miles northwest of Kirkella, and 120 miles southeast of Strassburg. The neighboring villages are Stockholm and Grayson, 8 miles distant on either side of the line.

DUBUQUE, a post office in Kent co., Ont., near Chatham station, on the C.P.R.

DU CAP, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que., in the township of Callieres.

DU CENTRE, a lake in Champlain co., Que.
DU CERF, a lake in Labelle co., township of Dudley.

DU CHEMIN DE CANOT, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

DU CHENE, or **BELLE RIVIERE**, rises in Two Mountains co., Que., and flowing southeast enters the Ottawa at St. Eustache. It is a fine mill stream and abounds with fish.

DU CHENE, or **POINT DU CHENE RIVER**, rises in a small lake in Argensteuil co., Que., and runs south-east into the Ottawa.

DUCHESNE MILLS, a settlement in Wright co., Que., 3 miles from Aylmer, on the Waltham branch of the C.P.R., and a station on the electric line between Ottawa and Aylmer.

DUCK AND PRINGLE, a village in Yale co., B.C., on the South Thompson River, and a station (Ducks) on the C.P.R., 268 miles from Vancouver, and 166 miles east of Yale. It has 1 store, 1 hotel, 1 public school and 1 flour mill. The country around it is mountainous and adapted chiefly for grazing. Pop. 50.

DUCK LAKE, a post village in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, situate east of the North and west of the South Saskatchewan Rivers, with a station on the Regina branch of the Can. Northern RR., 52 miles north of Saskatoon and 33 miles south of Prince Albert. The place is noted as the scene of hostilities in connection with the Riel rebellion in March, 1885. Duck Lake has 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Episcopal and Presbyterian), 7 stores, 2 hotels, 3 schools, 1 flour mill and 2 grain elevators, 1 bank agency of Bank of B. N. A., besides telegraph and express offices. The village is in a fine agricultural district, well wooded and watered. Pop. 500.

DUCK LAKE, a lake of that name in Saskatchewan dist., southwest of Prince Albert, some 2 miles long.

DUCK LAKE, a lake of Victoria co., Ont., affording fair fishing.

DUCK LAKE, a lake of Wolfe co., Que., a little over a mile square. It empties into the St. Francis River.

DUCK LAKE, a small lake of Kings co., N.B.
DUCK LAKES, two small lakes in Quebec co., Que., between Crooked Lake and Lake Kajoualwang.

DUCK RIVER, rises east of the Duck Mountains, in Marquette co., Man., and flows easterly by two channels—the north and the south Duck Rivers—into Lake Winnipegosis.

DUCKS, a settlement in Yale dist., B.C., on the South Thompson River, and a station on the C.P.R. main line, 17 miles west of Kamloops, and 267 miles northeast of Vancouver.

It lies in a hilly but good grazing region, and has several stores, hotel, school, and flour mill.

DUCLOS, a post office in Wright co., Que., 12 miles from Wakefield, on the Ottawa & Maniwaki div. of the C.P.R., 23 miles from Ottawa.

DU COIN, a lake in Portneuf co., Que., in the township of Rocmont.

DU COIN, a lake in Quebec co., Que.

DU CRAU, a lake in Charlevoix co., Que.

DU DIABLE, a lake in Joliette co., Que.

DU DIABLE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

DUDLEY, a post village in Muskoka dist., Ont., on the Can. Northern Ontario Ry., 5 miles north of Bala. It has 4 summer hotels, and is 13 miles from Gravenhurst on the G. T. R., at the foot of Muskoka Lake. Pop., about 50.

DUDSWELL CENTRE, a post village in Wolfe co., Que., on the St. Francis River, 1½ miles from Dudswell, on the Quebec Central and Maine Central Rys. It contains an Anglican church and 1 saw mill. The Dominion Lime works and Flag-stone quarries are within 1 mile. Pop. 75.

DUDSWELL JUNCTION, a station in Wolfe co., Que., on the Quebec Central RR. (Sherbrooke div.), 24 miles north of Sherbrooke, and 119 miles south of Quebec. See Dudswell Centre.

DUDSWELL LAKE, is a small body of water 1½ miles length in Wolfe (Richmond and Wolfe) co., Que., on which is the village of that name. It affords excellent fishing.

DUFFERIN, a post office in Frontenac co., Ont., 3 miles from Rideau on the G.T.R.

DUFFERIN, a village in Haldimand co., Ont., on the Michigan Central Ry., 5 miles from Hagersville, and 25 miles from Hamilton. It has 1 store. See Clanbrasil.

DUFFERIN, a post settlement in Queens co., N.B., situate between the Salmon River and Coal Creek, 4 miles from Chipman Station, on the N. B. Coal & Ry. Co.'s line. Pop. 48.

DUFFERIN, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que., in the township of Dufferin.

DUFFERIN BRIDGE, a post office in Parry Sound district, Ont., four miles from Sequin Falls, on the Parry Sound & Ottawa div. of the G.T.R. It has 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist). Pop. 43.

DUFFERIN MINES, and **PORT DUFFERIN**, a settlement in Halifax co., N.S., on the Salmon River (Big Lake). The water power which supplied the mines is at present (1907) closed. At Port Dufferin (4 miles from the Mines), there are 2 churches (Episcopal and Presbyterian), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill and 1 lobster canning factory, with telegraph office. The nearest railway stations are 50 or 60 miles distant—Brookfield and Shubenacadie. Pop. of Dufferin Mines, now under 25; of Port Dufferin, under 150.

DUFFERIN ROAD, a settlement in Pictou co., N.S., 2½ miles from Scotsburn, on the Oxford & Pictou branch of the I.C.R.

DUFFIN'S CREEK, Ontario co., Ont. See Pickering.

DUFF'S, a station on the Reid-Nfld. Ry., 23 miles from St. John's Nfld.

DUFOUR, a post office in Charlevoix co., Que., near St. Paul's Bay.

DUFRESNE, a post settlement (about 50 fam-

lles) in Provencher co., Man., on the Seine River and a station on the C.N.R., 22 miles east of Winnipeg. It has 1 church and 1 blacksmith shop.

DUFROST, a station in Provencher co., Man., on the Winnipeg and Emerson branch of the C.P.R., 40 miles south of Winnipeg, and 25 miles north of Emerson.

DUGALD, a post office in Selkirk co., Man., 14 miles from Winnipeg.

DUGAS, a station on the Can. Northern Quebec Ry., in Montcalm co., Que., 5 miles from St. Julien, the county seat, and 9 miles from Joliette, the nearest banking point.

DUGAS, a post settlement in Gloucester co., N.B., 5½ miles from Grand Anse, a station on the Caraquet Ry.

DUGDALE, a station in Yukon Territory, on the White Pass & Yukon RR., 5 miles south of White Horse.

DUGGAN'S COVE, a settlement in the dist. of St. Barbe, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 50.

DUHAMEL, a post office in Strathcona dist., Prov. of Alberta, near Wetaskiwin, on the Calgary & Edmonton div. of the C.P.R., 40 miles south of Edmonton.

DUHAMEL, a post settlement in Labelle co., Que., on the Ottawa River, 32 miles from Papineauville, on the C.P.R., North shore line, between Montreal and Ottawa. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill. Pop., about 200.

DU LOUP, RIVIERE, takes its rise near the centre of Kamouraska co., Que., and running north-east, south-west and north north-east is suddenly turned to the north-west into the St. Lawrence, by a point of land jutting into the latter in the form of a crescent, at the village to which it lends its name. About a mile in rear of the village, in Temiscouata co., is the Riviere du Loup Falls, an object of interest to tourists. Near it also is the summer watering place of Cacouna, on the St. Lawrence River.

DUMAS, a station on the Reston branch of the C.P.R., in the Province of Saskatchewan, 59 miles north-west of Reston, 40 miles from Kaiser.

DUMBARTON STATION, a post office in Charlotte co., N.B., also a village of the same name. The station (Dumbarton) on the C.P.R. (St. Anicet branch), is 19 miles from McAdam Jct. It contains 4 churches (Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, Methodist and Baptist), 4 stores, 1 grist mill and 2 saw mills, besides telegraph and express offices. Pop. (1901), 711.

DUMBLANE, a post settlement in Bruce co., Ont., 5½ miles from Paisley on the G.T.R. It has 1 church and school.

DUMFRIES, a flag station on the C.P.R., in Waterloo co., Ont., 163 miles from Toronto.

DUMFRIES, a post village in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, 18 miles from Harvey Station, on the C.P.R., 20 miles west of Fredericton Jct., and 20 miles east of McAdam Jct. It contains 1 Anglican church, and 1 tannery. Pop. 100.

DUMOINE, a post office in Pontiac co., Que. Mackey, on the C.P.R. (Upper Ottawa Valley div.), 46 miles northwest of Pembroke, is the nearest railway station. Pop., about 60.

DUMONT LAKE, a lake of Pontiac co., Que., well supplied with fish.

DUNALLEN, a post settlement in Souris co., Man., 8 miles from Boissevain, on the C.P.R. (Napinka branch), 20 miles from Delorsine. It contains 1 school house, used also for a Methodist church.

DUNANY, a post settlement in Argenteuil co., Que., 8 miles from Lacnute, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Anglican church, and 1 cheese factory. Pop. 100.

DUNARA, a post settlement in Selkirk co., Man., 18 miles from Selkirk. It contains 1 Presbyterian church and school, is in the centre of a well settled wheat and cattle district.

DUNBAR, a post village in Dundas co., Ont., 5 miles from Chesterville (on the C.P.R.), and 12 miles from Morrisburg, on the G.T.R. It has 2 stores, saw and grist mills, 2 cheese and butter factories, 1 school, and 2 churches. Pop. 50.

DUNBARTON, a post village in Ontario co., Ont., on the G.T.R., ½ a mile from Frenchman's Bay or Pickering Harbour. It contains 2 stores, 1 hotel and 1 Presbyterian church. Pop. 150.

DUNBORO, a post settlement in Missisquoi co., Que., 3½ miles from Sweetzburg station, on the C.P.R., 5 miles from East Farnham. It contains 1 Methodist church, 3 cheese factories and 2 telephone offices.

DUNBOYNE, a post settlement in Elgin co., Ont., on Silver Creek, 4 miles north of Lake Erie, and east of St. Thomas. It is situate 4 miles from Aylmer West, containing stations of the C.P.R. and G.T.R. (air line from Buffalo westward), 10 miles east of St. Thomas. It has 1 Union church, 1 grist mill and 1 cheese factory, besides a church school.

DUNCAN, a settlement in York co., Ont., and a station on the Can. Northern Ontario Ry., 11 miles from Thornbury, on the G.T.R., 8 miles from Meaford, the nearest railway, telegraph and express point. Pop., about 75.

DUNCAN, a post office in Grey co., Ont., 12 miles from Toronto.

DUNCAN, a post village at East Chester, in Lunenburg co., N.S., on the road between Chester and Halifax, 2½ miles from Chester Station, on the Halifax and South Western Ry. It has 2 stores and 2 lumber mills. Pop., 150.

DUNCAN, a post village in Drummond co., Que., and a station on the I.C.R., 9 miles west of Drummondville, and 55 miles northeast of Montreal.

DUNCAN COVE, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., 12 miles from Halifax. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 telegraph office and a life-boat station. Pop. 56.

DUNCAN STATION, a post village in the dist. of Nanaïmo, B.C., on the Cowichan River, and on the Esquimalt and Nanaïmo Ry., 40 miles from Victoria. It contains 3 churches (Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic), 12 stores, 3 hotels, 1 chopping mill, 1 creamery, 1 branch bank and 1 printing office issuing a weekly newspaper. Pop. 200.

DUNCANVILLE, a village in Russell co., Ont., 7 miles from Vars (Bearbrook), on the Ottawa and Swanton branch of the G.T.R., 17 miles from Ottawa. It contains 6 stores, 3 hotels, 3 churches (Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist), and 1 telegraph office. Pop. 200.

DUNCHURCH, a post settlement in Parry

Sound dist., Ont., 30 miles from Burk's Falls, on the G.T.R. Ahmic Harbor, reached by the Muskoka & Georgian Bay Nav. Co., is 4 miles distant. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian), 3 stores, 1 hotel, 1 saw mill and telegraph office. Pop. 250.

DUNCRIEFF, a post village in Middlesex co., Ont., 5 miles from Ilderton, and 8 miles from Alisa Craig on the G.T.R. It contains 1 store, 1 grist mill and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop. 75.

DUNDALK, an incorporated village in Grey co., Ont., on the C.P.R. It was incorporated in 1887, is 28 miles from Orangeville, and contains 4 churches (Roman Catholic, Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian), 12 stores, 3 hotels, 1 woollen mill, 1 saw mill, 1 foundry, 1 tannery, sash and door, and cheese and butter factories, 1 bank agency, newspaper, telegraph and Bell telephone offices. Pop. 762.

DUNDALK, a station on the White Pass and Yukon Ry., in Yukon Territory, 23 miles from White Pass.

DUNDAS, a county in the eastern part of Ontario, bordering on the St. Lawrence River. Area, 245,199 acres. Chief city, Cornwall. Pop. of co. (1901), 19,757.

DUNDAS, an incorporated town and port of entry in Wentworth co., Ont., at the head of Burlington Bay, formed at the western extremity of Lake Ontario, and on the G.T.R., C.P.R., and Q. H. & B. Rys., 5 miles west of Hamilton. It has agencies of several insurance companies, of the Bank of Hamilton and the Canadian Bank of Commerce, 2 printing offices issuing weekly newspapers, 2 telegraph agencies, 2 express companies, about 40 stores, 6 hotels, and churches for the Episcopalians, Roman Catholics, Methodists, Baptists and Presbyterians. It possesses unlimited water power, and has manufactories of iron castings, machinery of every description, edge tools, paper, leather, woollen and cotton goods, wooden ware, etc. The town is very prettily situated, and is very healthy. The site is a beautiful valley, from which the town is sometimes called the Valley City. H.R.H. Princess Louise, viewing the town and surroundings from the platform of the G. T. R. Station, while on her trip from the Western States in 1879, pronounced the scene the finest she had witnessed since leaving Ottawa. The Desjardins Canal gives it water communication with Hamilton and other ports; a street railway also connects it with Hamilton. Pop. 3,173.

DUNDAS, a post office in Kent co., N.B., 10 miles from Irishtown, on the Moncton & Buctouche RR.

DUNDAS, a post village in Kings co., P.E.I., on Grand River, 8 miles from Cardigan, or St. Peters, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It contains 3 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist), 2 stores, 1 hotel, grist and saw mills and 1 cheese factory with telephone and express offices at station. Pop. 350.

DUNDAS ISLAND, is on an inlet of the north Pacific Ocean, 40 miles northeast of the Queen Charlotte Islands, B.C., opposite Port Simpson, a little to the north of the Skeena River.

DUNDAS RIVER, a river of Victoria co., N.S., containing salmon.

DUNDEE, a post village in Huntingdon co., Que., on Salmon River, and on G.T.R. (Mont-

real, Mooser's Jct. and Massena Springs branch), (St. Agnes Station), 70 miles southwest of Montreal. The village is situated on the west side of the river, about 5 miles from its entrance into the St. Lawrence, and partly in the State of New York, the boundary line running through it. On the opposite side is Fort Covington, in the State of New York. Steamboats ascend to this point; also local steamer daily in summer to Hopkins' Point, Cornwall, Summerstown, St. Regis, and other tourist resorts. It is a port of entry, and has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Presbyterian), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill, 1 butter and 2 cheese factories, and 1 of Indian work; besides telegraph, telephone and express offices. Pop. of parish (1901), 1,610.

DUNDEE, a station on the P. E. Island Ry., in Kings co., P.E.I.

DUNDEE, a settlement in Richmond co. (Cape Breton Island), N.S., on the Black River, at its junction with the Bras d'Or Lakes, 5 miles from Grand Anse, a station on the Cape Breton RR. It has 1 Presbyterian church. There is good trout fishing on Black River, amid a scattered farming population.

DUNDEE, a post settlement in Restigouche co., N.B., on Restigouche River, 6 miles from Dalhousie Junction, on I.C.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian church. It is a good hunting and fishing district.

DUNDEE, a settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., near the line of the Prince Edward Island Ry., about 28 miles east of Charlottetown. Pop. 25.

DUNDEE, a post settlement in Selkirk co., Man., on Donaldson's Creek, 18 miles from Winnipeg, 15 miles from Tyndall, on the Main line C.P.R. It is noted for its rich and abundant pasturage, and its general suitability for settlement, having abundance of wood, water and the finest of prairie land. It contains 1 chopping mill. Pop. 73.

DUNDEE CENTRE, a post office in Huntingdon co., Que., 2½ miles from Ste. Agnes de Dundee Station, on the G.T.R., 26 miles from Massena Springs.

DUNDEE RIVER, a river of Restigouche co., N.B., flowing into Eel River.

DUNDELA, a post village in Dundas co., Ont., on St. Lawrence River, 9 miles from Iroquois, on G.T.R. It has 1 Methodist church and 1 store, and telephone office. Pop. 70.

DUNDONALD, a post village in Northumberland co., Ont., 7 miles from Colborne, the nearest railway and banking town. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 saw mill. Pop. 100.

DUNDURN, a post settlement engaged in stock-raising in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 137 miles northwest of Regina and 23 miles south of Saskatoon. It has 1 branch bank.

DUNEDIN, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 5 miles from Creemore and 16 miles from Collingwood. It has 1 Presbyterian church, saw and grist mills, 1 store and carriage works. Pop. 80.

DUNDELIN, a post hamlet in Queens co., P.E.I., on the West River, 7 miles from North Wiltshire, on the P. E. Island Ry. It contains 1 store.

DUNGANNON, a post village in Huron co., Ont., on Nine Mile Creek, 9 miles from Lucknow, on the G.T.R. It contains 3 churches, 1

telegraph office, 6 stores, 2 hotels, saw and grist mills and bank agency. Pop. 500.

DUNGARVON, a small settlement in Northumberland co., N.B., 7 miles from Blackville, on the Fredericton branch of the I.C.R.

DUNGARVON, a river of Northumberland co., N.B., enters the Renous about 7 miles from its mouth, after a course of 47 miles. It is the outlet of a chain of lakes, the largest of which, called Barton Lake, has a south branch called Little Dunganvon. The Dunganvon abounds with salmon, trout and other fish. Canoes can ascend to its source.

DUNGIVEN, a post settlement in Westmoreland co., N.B., on Memramcook River, 3 miles from Memramcook, on I.C.R. It contains grist and saw mills, a church and a telegraph office.

DUNHAM, an incorporated village in Missisquoi co., Que., 5 miles from Cowansville Station, on the C.P.R. It contains 3 churches (Episcopal, Methodist and Roman Catholic), 9 stores, 1 hotel, sash and door and butter factories, telegraph and telephone offices, a ladies' college and a bank agency. Pop. 277.

DUNKELD, a post office in Bruce co., Ont., on the G.T.R. (Southampton division), 5 miles from Walkerton. It has 1 hotel. Pop. 50.

DUNKERRON, a post office in Simcoe co., Ont., 8 miles from Tottenham, on the Hamilton & Allandale div. of the G.T.R., 5 miles from Beeton.

DUNKIN, a post village in Brome co., Que., on the Missisquoi River, 3 miles from Mansonsville Station, on the C.P.R., 6 miles from Glen Sutton. It has 2 churches (Episcopal and Free Baptist), 1 store, 1 saw and grist mill, 2 blacksmith shops, 1 cheese factory, and Bell telephone office. A large industry of the village is carried on in bark wood and logs. Pop., under 100.

DUNK RIVER, empties into Redique Bay, in Prince co., P.E.I., on the south, or Northumberland Strait, shore. It is noted for its fine salmon and trout.

DUNLEATH, a post office in Mackenzie dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, 8 miles from Saltcoats on the Yorkton & Sheho section of the C.P.R.

DUNLOP, a post village and farming settlement in Huron co., Ont., 3 miles from the G.T.R. station at Goderich. The C.P.R. is now building a branch line near to the village. It has 1 general store (with telephone office). Artesian wells are in the neighborhood. Pop., about 200.

DUNLOP, a post settlement in Gloucester co., N.B., situate between Peter's River and Little Nepisiguit millstream. $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Beresford, and 8 miles from Bathurst (both on Nepisiguit Bay, an inlet of Chaleurs Bay), Bathurst being on the line of the I.C.R. It has 1 Roman Catholic church, several good schools, 1 general store and 1 saw and lumber mill. It is in a good farming district, the population being mostly Scotch. Pop., under 100.

DUNMAGLASS, a post settlement in Antigonish co., N.S., 12 miles from Antigonish, and 6 miles from Avondale, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 1 store, and 1 grist mill. Pop. 100.

DUNMORE, a post settlement in Antigonish co., N.S., 9 miles from Antigonish, 13 miles from Bayfield, and 5 miles from South River, a station on the I.C.R. It contains 1 rotary saw mill, 1 store and telephone office. Pop. 141.

DUNMORE, a post office in Renfrew co., Ont., 5 miles from Douglas, on the Eganville branch of the C.P.R. and on the Ottawa and Parry Sound branch G.T.R., 19 miles from Pembroke.

DUNMORE JUNCTION, a settlement and station on the C.P.R., in the Prov. of Alberta, near Medicine Hat. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 store, 1 hotel, and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 200.

DUNNET, a post office in Nipissing dist., Ont., near Warren Station, on the C.P.R., 43 miles west of North Bay (on Lake Nipissing) and 37 miles east of Sudbury.

DUNNS, a station on the New Brunswick Southern Ry., in St. John co., N.B., 15 miles from St. John.

DUNN'S VALLEY, a country post office in Algoma dist., Ont., 16 miles from Thessalon, on the C.P.R. ("Soo" branch). It has 1 Methodist church.

DUNNVILLE, an incorporated village and river port in Haldimand co., Ont., on Grand River, which is here navigable for steamboats, and on the G.T.R. (Buffalo and Goderich div.), 40 miles south southeast of Hamilton, and 40 miles west of Buffalo. It has Episcopalian, Baptist, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist churches, express and telegraph offices, 2 branch banks, 49 stores, 5 hotels, 3 printing offices issuing weekly newspapers, woollen, carriage and vinegar factories, 2 iron foundries, 3 planing and 2 grist mills, and evaporator factory. Dunnville is a port of entry; is lighted by electricity, and has unlimited water power. Pop. 2,300.

DUNPHY, a small settlement in Northumberland co., N.B., a few miles from Blackville, on the Fredericton br. of the I.C.R. Pop. 100.

DUNRAVEN, a post office in Pontiac co., Que., a few miles from Campbell's Bay, on the C.P.R. (Ottawa & Waltham div.) It has 1 Presbyterian church and 2 schools.

DUNREA, a post settlement in Souris co., Man., a station on the Can. Northern R.R. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Presbyterian), 8 stores, 2 hotels, with express and telegraph offices. The village is near the French settlement of St. Felix, whose people worship in Dunrea. Pop., 200.

DUNROBIN, a post settlement in Carleton co., Ont., 7 miles from Carp, on the G.T.R., 20 miles from Ottawa. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Methodist), and 2 stores. Pop., about 50.

DUNSFORD, a post settlement in Victoria co., Ont., and a station on the Lindsay and Bobcageon branch of the C.P.R., 12 miles from Lindsay. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian), 1 branch bank and 2 stores.

DUNSIANNANE, a small settlement in Kings co., N.B., 4 miles from Penobscus. The latter is a station on the I.C.R., 51 miles northeast of St. John. Pop. 50.

DUNSMERE, a station on the Reid-Nfld. Ry., 7 miles from St. John's, Nfld.

DUNSTAFFNAGE, a post settlement in Queens co., P.E.I., on the Hillsborough River, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Suffolk Station, on the P. E. Island R.R., 1 mile from Bedford. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Baptist), 1 general store, and 1 cheese and butter factory. Pop. 80.

DUNTRON, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., on the G.T.R. (Beeton and Collingwood branch), 8 miles from Collingwood. It contains

2 churches (Presbyterian and Anglican), 1 telegraph and express office, 2 hotels, and 2 stores. Pop. 150.

DUNVEGAN, a post on the Peace River in the Prov. of Alberta, on the line of the projected Grand Trunk Pacific R.R. It lies to the west of Lesser Slave Lake and to the south west of the Hudson Bay Co.'s post at Peace River Landing.

DUNVEGAN, a post village in Glengarry co., Ont., 5 miles from Greenfield, on the G.T.R. (Ottawa & Swanton div.) It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 3 stores and 1 hotel. Pop. 150.

DUNVEGAN, a post village in Inverness co., N.S., 7 miles from Inverness on the Inverness & Richmond R.R. It has 1 general store, 1 hotel and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop. 200.

DUNVEGAN FORT, in Athabasca dist., Prov. of Alberta, on Peace River. Lat. 56° 14' N. lon. 117° 30' W.

DUNVILLE, a station on the Placentia branch of the Reid-Nfld. R.R., 16 miles west of Placentia Jct., and 4 miles east of Placentia, Nfld., on Placentia Bay.

DUPAS ISLE, a long narrow island in the St. Lawrence, on the north shore below Berthier. It is 6 miles long by 16 acres broad.

DUPEY'S CORNER, a settlement on Northumberland Strait, in Westmoreland co., N.B., 10 miles from Shediac, a station on the I.C.R. It has 1 general store, 1 hotel and 1 flour mill, with connection at Shediac with its telephone, telegraph and express offices. Pop. 350.

DU PLAT MUSQUE, a lake in Labelle co., Que., in the township of La Minerve.

DU PORTAGE, a lake in Dorchester co., Que.

DU PORTAGE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

DUPUIS, a post office in Qu'Appelle dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan.

DU RACOURCI, a lake in Champlain co., Que.

DURBAN, a small post settlement in Marquette co., Man., on the Can. Northern R.R., north of the Duck Mountains. It has 2 stores, 1 blacksmith shop, 1 bank agency and 1 saw mill. Pop., under 50.

DURELL, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., 12 miles from St. Peters, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It contains lobster and cheese factories, and there are Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Baptist churches. Pop. 100.

DURHAM, a county of Ontario, on the north coast of Lake Ontario, comprises an area of 402,549 acres. It is intersected by the main line and Midland division of the G.T.R. Capital, Port Hope. Pop. of co. (1901), 27,570.

DURHAM, a flourishing town in Grey co., Ont., on the Saugeen River, 17 miles from Walkerton. Durham is now a station on the G.T.R. (Durham and Palmerston div.) 15 miles north of Mount Forest. It possesses good water power, and contains 5 churches, 2 bank agencies, 2 telegraph offices, 3 hotels, 25 stores, 2 printing offices issuing weekly newspapers, saw, planing and flour mills, besides 1 tannery, 1 foundry, 1 furniture factory, 1 cream separator and 1 Portland cement works. Pop. 1,300.

DURHAM, a post village in Pictou co., N.S., 7 miles from Pictou (on a branch of the I.C.R.). Here is one of the oldest cemeteries in the Province, and here the first Presbyterian seminary in the Dominion was established, the site of which yet remains. Pop. 115.

DURHAM BRIDGE, a post village in York co.,

N.B., on Nashwaak River, and a station $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile distant, named Durham) on the Fredericton section of the I.C.R., 2 miles from Nashwaak and 15 miles from Fredericton. It has 3 churches (Episcopal, Methodist and Baptist), 3 stores, 2 saw mills, besides post and telegraph offices. Pop. 175.

DURHAM CENTRE, a post settlement in Restigouche co., N.B., situated at the mouth of the Jacquet River, and 1 mile from Jacquet River Station, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 store, 2 lumber and shingle mills and 1 wood working factory. Pop. 200.

DURICLE, a small fishing settlement in the district of Burin, Nfld., on the west side of Placentia Bay, 3 miles from Burin. Pop. (1901), 11.

DURKEE LAKE, a small lake in Annapolis co., N.S., one of the sources of Allan's River.

DURLAND, or NEW GERMANY, a prosperous post village in Lunenburg co., N.S., on La Have River, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from New Germany Station, on Halifax and South Western Ry. It contains 3 churches (Anglican, Methodist and Lutheran), 7 stores, 2 hotels, pulp, shingle, saw, grist, stave, lath and carding mills, 1 tannery and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 2,000.

DUROCHER, a station on the C.V.R., in Misamisquoi co., Que., 6 miles from Farnham, 18 miles from Frelighsburg.

DU RUISSEAU, a lake in Portneuf co., Que., in the township of Roemont.

DUSABLE, a lake in Pontiac co., Que.

DUSSAULT, a lake in Champlain co., Que.

DUTCH BROOK, a post settlement in Cape Breton co., N.S., near Joe's Lake, 5 miles from Sydney, on the I.C.R. It contains 1 Presbyterian meeting house and 8 farm houses. Pop. 80.

DUTCH SETTLEMENT, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Elmsdale, a station on the I.C.R.

DUTCH VILLAGE, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Halifax, on the I.C.R. Pop., about 100.

DUTHILL, a post office in a good farming dist., in Lambton co., Ont., on the north branch of the Sydenham River, 6 miles from Sombra, a station on the Erie & Huron div. of the Pere Marquette R.R. It has 1 Presbyterian church.

DUTTON, an incorporated village in Elgin co., Ont., and a station on the Michigan Central & Pere Marquette Ry. It contains 4 churches (Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Episcopal), 16 stores, 2 hotels, 1 flour, 1 woolen and 2 planing mills, 2 factories, 1 private bank branches of Traders and Molsoms Banks, 2 foundries, 1 printing office issuing a newspaper and telegraph, express and telephone offices and 2 schools. Pop. 863.

DUVAR ROAD, a post settlement in Prince co., P.E.I. and a station (Duvar), on the P. E. Island R.R., 8 miles from Alberton. It has a Roman Catholic church, and a Presbyterian church 3 miles distant, 5 mills on the Mill River (carding, saw and grist), with stores (2 and 3 miles off) at O'Learys and Bloomfield, where there is also express and telegraph facilities. Pop. 225.

DWIGHT, a post village in the district of Muskoka, Ont., on the north bay of Trading Lake 14 miles from Huntville, on the G.T.R. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores, 2 hotels and telephone office. Pop. 20.

DWYER HILL, a post office in Carleton co., Ont., 6 miles from Ashton, on the C.P.R.

DYEA, a settlement in the extreme north-west angle of B.C., close to Skagway and the White Horse Pass and Yukon R.R. line.

DYER, a post office in Stormont co., Ont., close to the line of the Ottawa & Montreal div. of the G.T.R., between the stations of Moose Creek and Maxville.

DYER HARBOR, a village in St. John co., N.B., on the Bay of Fundy. It contains 2 churches (Anglican and Baptist), 2 stores, 2 lumber mills, and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 400.

DYERS, a station on the N.B. Southern R.R. in Charlotte co., N.B., 20 miles from St. Stephen, 62 miles west of St. John. The post office is called Elmsville, which see for description.

DYER'S BAY, a post village in Bruce co., Ont., 45 miles from Wiarton on the Georgian Bay and Lake Erie div. of the G.T.R. It contains 1 Methodist church, 1 store and 1 saw mill.

DYMENT, a post office in Rainy River dist., northwest Ont., and a station on the C.P.R., 34 miles northwest of Ignace.

DYMOND LAKE, a lake of Renfrew co., Ont.

DYNEVOR, a post settlement in the southern portion of the St. Peter's Indian Reserve, on the Red River, in Selkirk co., Man., 3 miles from Selkirk, on the C.P.R. It contains 1 Anglican church. The Indian hospital was at one time the residence of the Anglican superintendent of Indian Missions. Pop. 550.

DYSART, a station on the Hallburton and Lindsay branch of the G.T.R., 6½ miles from Hallburton. Pop., under 50.

DYSART, a settlement on the Qu'Appelle River in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on the C.P.R. (Pheasant Hills branch), 9 miles from Lipton. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and German Lutheran), 2 stores, and 1 hotel. Pop. 75.

EADY, a post village in Simcoe co., Ont., on the Coldwater River, and a station on the Muskoka branch of the C.P.R., 15 miles northwest of Orillia. It has 1 Methodist church, 1 general store and 1 flour and feed mill. Pop. 100.

EAGER, a station in Kootenay dist., B.C., on the C.P.R., 5 miles from Cranbrook, near the Kootenay River.

EAGLE, a post village in Elgin co., Ont., on Lake Erie, 4 miles from West Lorne Station, on the Mich. Central RR., 18 miles from Newbury, and 26 miles from St. Thomas. It contains 1 saw mill, 1 store, 1 church and 1 hotel. Pop. 150.

EAGLE, a small lake in Addington co., Ont., south of Sharbot Lake.

EAGLE BUTTE, a post office in the Prov. of Alberta, 28 miles from Irvine, a station on the C.P.R., 16 miles east of Dunmore Jct., and 22 miles east of Medicine Hat.

EAGLE CREEK, a post office in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, near Saskatoon, on the Regina branch of the C.N.R., 160 miles north west of Regina.

EAGLE HEAD, a post village in Queens co., N.S., 7 miles from Liverpool, a station on the Halifax & South Western RR. Pop., about 125.

EAGLE HILL, a settlement in the Prov. of Alberta, 10 miles west of Olds, on the line of the C.P.R., 58 miles north of Calgary. It

has 1 general store, 1 church (Adventist), and 1 printing office.

EAGLE LAKE, a post office in Parry Sound dist., Ont., 7 miles from Sunbridge, on the Toronto & North Bay div. of the G.T.R., 12 miles north of Burk's Falls.

EAGLE LAKE, in the Algonquin National Park, Nipissing dist., Ont. It is reached by Rainy Lake station on the Ottawa & Parry Sound div. of the G.T.R., 22 miles west of Algonquin Park station.

EAGLE LAKE, a body of water, of which there are seven so named in the province, in Rainy River dist., north-west Ontario, east of the Lake of the Woods, and north of Manitow River. Area, 81,820 acres.

EAGLE LAKE, a small lake in the township of Preston, Halifax co., N.S., discharges its waters by a small stream running into Cole Harbor.

EAGLE LAKE, a small lake in Kings co., N.B.

EAGLE LAKE, a lake in Rimouski co., Que.

EAGLE LAKE MINES, a small settlement in Frontenac co., Ont., south of Sharbot Lake, and 2 miles across Eagle Lake from Parham Station, on the Kingston & Pembroke RR. The mines (1907) are temporarily closed. The settlement has 1 Presbyterian church, 1 general store, 1 hotel and 1 saw mill, with express and telegraph offices at Parham. Pop., at present, while mines are closed, a few farmers.

EAGLE RIVER, a small river of Labarre co., Que.

EAGLE RIVER, a post village in Rainy River dist., north-west Ont., and a station (Eagle) on the C.P.R., 30 miles west of Wabigoon, and 65 miles east of Rat Portage (Kenora), on the Lake of the Woods.

EAGLE'S NEST, a settlement in Selkirk dist., Man., 10 miles from Selkirk.

EAGLE'S NEST, a post village in the suburbs of Brantford, and now incorporated with it, though its post office retains its name, in Brant co., Ont., on the Grand River, and has a station ¼ of a mile distant, on the G.T.R. It has 3 churches (Episcopal, Methodist and Baptist), 9 stores, 1 hotel, 1 waggon and 2 plough manufacturing factories. Pop. 2,500.

EAGLETON, a post office in Souris co., Man., 14 miles from Sinclair, on the Brandon & Regina div. of the C.P.R., 47 miles from Souris.

EAKINDALE, a post settlement in the Prov. of Saskatchewan, 11 miles from Saltcoats Station, on the C.P.R. (North Western branch), 17 miles southeast of Yorkton, and 51 miles northwest of Binscarth, Man. It has 1 good school house, in which the Methodists hold service. Pop., under 40.

EAL or ERL, a small lake in Guysborough co., N.S.

EALING, a post office in London dist., Middlesex co., Ont., via London, on G.T.R. and C.P.R.

EAMER'S CORNERS, a post village in Stormont co., Ont., 5 miles from Cornwall, on the G.T.R., the county seat and nearest railway and bank location. It contains 2 hotels. Pop., under 100.

EARDLEY, a post village in Wright co., Que., on the Walkham branch of the C.P.R., 21 miles from Hull, the county seat and nearest bank location. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores and 1 hotel. Pop., under 150.

EARL GREY, a post office in Assa, West, Prov. of Saskatchewan, and a station on
