Accidental is The Verdict on Death of Ferdinand Mary
Fell Beneath Mine Cars Sustain ing Crushed Chest and Injuries to Head-Died in Coleman Hospital.
The inquest on the death of Ferdinand Mary, 37-year-old brakeman at International mine,
whose death resulted from head and chest injuries while working on C. level on Wednesday morn ing, July 20, was held in the

No person saw Mary fall be tween the cars, though Lawrenc Cyr stated that as the mine car were passing at aboutthree miles an hour, Mary stepped to the bumpers between the second and Shortly after he saw Mary's ligh disappear over the cars, and flag ged the driver to stop. Mary ged the driver to stop. Mary
was found beneath a car, with his legs over the rail. He im mediately notified the drive boss, Nick Milo.
The latter stated that he found Mary under the sixth car. He weight from Mary's chest, telling Lawrence Cyr to try to drag him out. Being unsuccessful, Milo told Cyr to hold up the car, and he dragged Mary out. His gloved hand had caught in the bolts beneath the car. While engaged in his efforts to extricate Mary, H. W. Clark arrived and he took charge.
Mr. Clark stated that shortly after 10 a.m. on proceeding to seam, he found Nick Milo No. 2 ing for the doctor, and he phoned to have a stretcher and First Aid men come at once, and also arranged for the doctor to meet
the stretcher party. Mary was the stretcher party. Mary was parallel to the track, with cuts parallel to the track, with cuts on his head, and his skull appeared to be fractured. His breath said his mouth was full of said his mouth was full of coal
dust. He was suffering from shock, though he did not appear to be in pain at the time.
