
FIRE IN FRANK! by Ian McKenzie

For many years the new town of Frank had no organized fire protection. The August 17, 1905 edition of *The Frank Paper* noted with satisfaction that a town lot on Fifth Street adjacent to Ashdown's livery stable (behind the Frank Hotel) had finally been purchased for a fire hall. In September the new fire hall was painted, and a room for the captain of the volunteer brigade was later added, but obtaining hoses with compatible couplings seemed to be a problem.

The real threat in Frank was, of course, a fire during strong winds. The brigade's first callout in 1907 resulted in a house being gutted by fire, but was judged a success as the fire had not spread to the rest of town. The event did inspire more thorough training, and generated discussion over the need for a fire alarm system in the expanding town. The use of the Knox Presbyterian Church bell was rejected, and an electric alarm system was thought to be too expensive, so instead a compromise of an electric alarm connected to the mine whistle was adopted. The fire hall was also enlarged in 1907 to accept a new hand-drawn hook and ladder truck, as well as two hose reels, buckets, and chemical extinguishers.

In October 1917 the fire hall's tower blew down in a storm, the same year that the Catholic Church on the north side toppled. By then the mine had permanently closed and the old Frank townsite was on its last legs, so the citizenry called for a new fire hall to be located in the north townsite. A tender was called, but it is not known if the old fire hall was relocated or a new structure was built behind the brick liquor store (present Allied Arts gallery). At any rate, the new fire hall did not have a tower, and utilized the bell in the Methodist Church (present Masonic Hall) across the street to call the volunteer fireman to action.

Arson became a problem during the Great Depression. The CPR roundhouse burned in 1934 and two locomotives were damaged, but the Frank and Blairmore fire departments saved the adjacent coal bunker. In 1936 Dypolt's vacant store was lightly damaged and the abandoned

NWMP stable was completely destroyed, then on October 10 the fire hall itself was set ablaze. Responding firemen found the church ablaze as well, and the alarm bell rope had been tied up out of reach. The church was saved, but the fire hall and all of its equipment was destroyed.

After 1936 the fire brigade was housed in the basement of the church, until about 1948 when the purchase of a modern fire truck led to the construction of the cinder block garage on 21st Avenue at 149th Street. The bell was removed from the church tower and put on display behind the Dunlop Guns, but was stolen in the 1970s. Frank ceased to have its own fire department after amalgamation.

CROWSNEST HERITAGE INITIATIVE

The Crowsnest Heritage Initiative is an umbrella organization with many members representing other Crowsnest heritage groups such as the Crowsnest Historical Society, the Ecotrust Museum, the Frank Slide Interpretive Centre, the Coleman Seniors' Association and the Hillcrest Memorial Cemetery Committee as well as members of the public. Its primary function is the initiation and coordination of heritage projects implemented by subcommittees of interested individuals and partner organizations. Here are some updates on ongoing projects:

CROWSNEST HERITAGE SIGNAGE PROJECT

More heritage signs are planned for Crowsnest Pass. The signage committee is raising money, writing texts and selecting photographs. This spring they will replace and repair damaged signs along the Crowsnest Heritage Driving Route as well as begin landscaping around historic information signage already in place. Crowsnest Heritage Driving Route maps are available at many local Crowsnest Pass businesses. Look for the Crowsnest Heritage Driving Route logo in their windows.

ALBERTA PROVINCIAL POLICE BARRACKS BUILDING RESTORATION PROJECT

The Alberta Provincial Police barracks were purchased by the Crowsnest Historical Society in 2002. In 2009 the building was moved so that a solid foundation could be built underneath it. Money is being raised for the building's restoration, the second phase of the project.

COLEMAN MINER'S UNION HOSPITAL RESTORATION PROJECT

The old hospital is now the Coleman Seniors Drop-In Centre. Last year new windows were installed that more closely resemble ones that the building had in the early 20th century.
