AYLWIN, a township on the western side of the Gatineau River. Its chief village is snazubazua. There are also two post offices within this township, and the celebrated Snazubazua Plains, an extensive tract of sand which was once a rich pinery, known as the "Alder-shot" of Canada. Pop. 900.

AYR, an incorporated village in Waterloo co., Ont., on the Nith River, 8 miles from Paris, 10 miles from Galt, on the C.P.R. It contains 2 Presbyterian and 1 Methodist churches, 8 stores, 2 good hotels, 2 flour mills, 4 factorles, 1 bank, 1 printing office which issues the "Ayr News," 2 express and 2 telegraph offices. Ayr possesses a beautiful na-tural park on bank of the river which is the popular resort for picnicking and boating parties. Pop. 827.

AYTON, a post settlement in Grey co., Ont., on the south branch of the Saugeen River, and a station on the Georgian Bay and Lake Erie branch of the G.T.R., 10 miles from Harrison. Its port is Owen Sound. It contains 5 churches (2 Lutheran, 1 Evangelical, 1 Pres-byterian, and 1 Roman Catholic), 5 stores, 3 hotels, 1 flour mill, 1 saw mill, 2 planing mills, 1 cider mill, 1 cordage factory, 1 branch bank, telegraph and express offices, and a printing office issuing a weekly newspaper. Pop. 500. AZILDA, a post office in Nipissing dist., Ont.,

and a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 7 miles west of Sudbury. BABINE LAKE, a considerable body of water

in Cassiar dist., B.C., on which there is a post of the Hudson Bay Co. It is reached from Victoria and Vancouver by steamer on the Pacific to Port Essington, at the mouth of the Skeena River (589 miles) thence up the river to Hazleton (150 miles), and then by rail east-ward (65 miles), in all 800 miles. Babine Lake lies west of Cross and Stuart Lakes. Its area is 196,000 acres. See Nata-Punket.

BABINE RIVER, the outlet of Babine Lake, in Cassiar dist., B.C., which empties northwestward into the Skeena.

BABINGTON, a hamlet in Queens co., N.B., near Young's Cove Road, on the Central Ry. of New Brunswick.

BACCALIEU, a settlement in the dist of Bay-

BACCARO, a post village in Shelburne co., N.S., 15 miles from Barrington Passage, the the terminus of the Halifax & Yarmouth Ry. It contains 1 Methodist church, 4 stores, and 1

BACCARO POINT, a fishing settlement in Shelburne co., N.S., on the sea coast adjoining Cape Sable Island, 12 miles from Shel-burne. A lighthouse on this point exhibits a fixed red light, 49 feet above the level of the sea. Pop., about 225.

BACK BAY, a post village on an arm of Bay of Fundy, in Charlotte co., N.B., 8 miles from St. George, the nearest railway station. It contains 1 church (Dis. of Christ), 3 stores, 1 small hotel. Its chief industry is that of fish-Pop. 200. ing.

BACK COVE, a fishing settlement in the district of Fogo, on Fogo Island, Nfid. It is separated from Fogo Harbor merely by a nar-

Fow neck of land. Pop. (1901), 48. BACK LANDS, a post office in Antigonish co., N.S. Afton, on the I.C.R., is the nearest railway station.

BACK LANDS GRAND RIVER (NORTH SIDE), a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Nfid. Pop (1901), 51. BACK MEADOWS, a post village noted for

its beautiful scenery, situated between the Rivers Black Branch and Cariboo in Pictou co., N.S., on Oxford and Pictou branch of the I.C.R., 14 miles from Pictou, and 2 miles from post office. Pop. 225.

BACK RIVER, Hochelaga co., Que. See Sault-au-Recollet.

BACK, or GREAT FISH RIVER, in Mac-kenzie dist., N.W.T., rises in Sussex Lake north of Lake Aylmer, flows north and northeast through a granite and sandy region, traverses Lakes Pelly and Garry, and enters a bay in the Arctic Ocean (north of Keewatin dist.), lat. 62° 7' 31" N., lon. 96° 39' 45" W.

dist.), lat. 62° 7' 31″ N., lon. 96° 39' 45″ W. BACK SHORE, a post office in Pictou co., N.S., 2½ miles from Hiver John station, on the I.C.R. It contains an Episcopal church and 3 lobster canneries. 95° and 108° W., explored by Captain Back, in 1818-37.

BACON COVE (UPPER and LOWER), a fishing settlement in Harbor Main dist., Niid., at the head of Conception Bay, 42 miles from St. John's Pop. (1901), 137.

BADDECK, a river of Nova Scotia, takes its rise near the source of the Middle River, in what is called the Moose Forest Island of Cape Breton, and flowing through a fine agricultural country, empties itself into St. Patrick's Chan-nel, an arm of Bras d'Or Lake, at the town of Baddeck. It is frequented by salmon and trout.

BADDECK, a post town in Victoria co., N.S., 12 miles from Iona, or Grand Narrows Station, on the north side of Big Bras d'Or Lake, 40 miles from Sydney and 43 miles from Mabou. It contains Episcopal, Presbyterian, Methodist and Roman Catholic chnrches, 7 stores, 2 hotels, post office savings bank, and Union Bank of Halifax, telegraph and express offices, A steam ferry connects it with Iona and Grand Narrows. It is a popular summer resort. Pop. 1,000.

BADDECK BAY, a post settlement on the north side of the bay of that name, 3 miles east of Baddeck, Victoria co., N.S., 12 miles from Grand Narrows Station, on the I.C.R. It possesses a school house, temperance hall and 2 or 3 blacksmith shops. Pop. 200.

BADDECK BRIDGE, a post settlement in Victoria co., N.S., 4 miles from Baddeck. The nearest station is Alba, on the I.C.R. Pop., about 300.

BADDECK RIVER, a settlement near the ras d'Or Lakes in Victoria co., Cape Breton Bras d'Or Lakes in Victoria co., Cape Breton Island, N.S., on Gillis Brook and the North Branch River, 12 miles from Grand Narrows Station, on the I.C.R., 33 miles south-west of North Sydney Jct. It has 1 Presbyterian church, 1 board and shingle mill, and 1 bank (Merchants of Halifax). Pop., under 100.

BADDELY, a river in Chicoutimi co., Que., named after its explorer, Lieut. Baddely. It is between 7 and 8 miles long, and runs into Lake Kenogamichiche.

BADDOW, a post settlement in Victoria co., Ont., situated in south-west corner of Somer-ville. It is 6 miles north-west of Fenelon Falls, on the G.T.R., and 5 miles from Coboconk. It contains 1 Baptist and 1 Methodist chapel. Pop. 100.

BADEN, a thriving post village in Waterloo co., Ont., on the G.T.R., 10 miles west of Ber-lin. It contains 3 churches, 1 large iron foundry, woollen mill, flax mill, linseed mill, flouring mill, cigar box and stave factories, a tannery, 1 bank agency, post and telegraph offices, 3 hotels, and 5 stores. Pop., under 600.

BADEN, a station on the Can. Northern RR. (Prince Albert div.), in Marquette co., Man., 50 miles north of Swan River, and 43 miles south-east of Erwood.

BADENOCH, a post office in Bruce co., Ont., 4½ miles from Mildmay, a station on the Hamilton & Southampton branch of the G.T.R., 6 miles south-east of Walkerton.

BADGER, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfld. Pop. (1901), 23.

BADGER, a station on the Port Arthur and Winnipeg branch of the Can. Northern RR., and a post office in Provencher co., Man., 20 miles north-west of Sprague and 75 miles south-east of Winnipeg.

BADGER BAY, a settlement in the dist. of

BADGER BAY, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfid. Pop. (1901), 42. BADGER BAY, a settlement in the dist. of BADGER BROK, a station (on the Reid-Nfid. RR. (Bishop's Falls section), 16 miles east of Millertown Jct., and 27 miles west of Bishop's Falls, Nfld.

BADGERDALE, a settlement in the Province of Saskatchewan (formerly in Assa. dist.), 18 miles from Canora, a station on the Canadian Northern branch of the C.P.R., 124 miles north-West of Dauphin, and 302 miles northwest of Winnipeg, Man. It has 1 general store, with express and telegraph offices at Canora. Pop. 260.

BADJEROS, a post office in Grey co., Ont.. on Mad River, 10 miles from Dundalk Station, on the Toronto, Orangeville and Owen Sound branch of the C.P.R. It contains 2 churches (Methodist and Presbyterian), 2 stores, a fine new school building, and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop. 50.

BAD THROAT RIVER, a river in Selkirk co., fan., flows into Lake Winnipeg. Man

BAFFIN BAY, a large gulf or inland sea, communicating with the North Atlantic by Davis Strait on the north-east coast of Frank-lin dist., of the Dominion of Canada. between lat. 68° and 78° N. and lon. 52° and 80° W., extending from south-east to north-west about 950 miles, with a mean breadth of 280 miles. It is flanked on the east by Greenland. It was first explored by William Baffin, in 1616, in honor of whom it was named, and more fully by Captain Ross in 1818 and Captain Parry, by Captain Russ in 1810 and captain places, but of extremely unequal bottom, the ascer-tained depth varying from 200 to 1,050 fathoms. Its shores are rocky and precipitous, attaining a height in many places of 1,000 feet, with perpetual snow. The coasts are rendered remarkable by the presence of prodigious numbers of high, sharp, conical rocks, so artificial in form and appearance that they are called monuments. Both sides of the bay are indented with numerous sounds, creeks and inlets, few of which, however, have yet been explored. It abounds in black whales of a large size, and in seals.

BAGDAD, a settlement in Queens co., N.B., on the Washadamoak River, 3 miles from Young's Cove Road station on the Central Ry. of N.B. It contains 1 Anglican church.

BAGLEY, a post office in Humboldt dist ... Prov. of Saskatchewan. The nearest station is Prince Albert, a station on the C.P.R., and the Can. Northern RR.

BAGNALL LAKE, a small lake in Renfrew co., Ont.

BAGOT, a post village and station on the I.C.R., in Bagot co., Que., 13 miles north-east of St. Hyacinthe, and 16 miles south-west of

Drummondville. See Ste. Helene de Bagot. BAGOT, a county in the southern part of the Province of Quebec, intersected, by the G.T.R., and having the Richelieu River for its western boundary. Area, 213,088 acres. Pop. (1901). 16.291.

BAGOT, a post office and station on the C.P.R. in Portage la Prairie co., Man., 70 G.P.R. In Fortage in France Co., Main, jo miles west of Winnipeg, and 62 miles east of Brandon. It contains 2 stores, telegraph and express offices. It is the centre of a wheat-growing country, very suitable for mixed farming and stock raising. Pop. 55.

BAGOT SOUTH, Renfrew co., Ont. See Springtown.

BAGOT'S BLUFF, the extreme west point of the island of Anticosti: lat. 49° 52′ 20″ N., lon. 68° 22′ 44″ W. On it is a lighthouse. BAGOTVILLE, an incorporated village in Chicoutimi co., Que., on the Saguenay River, Ha! Ha! Bay, 10 miles from Chicoutimi, on the Ourbace and Late St taba the Quebec and Lake St. John RR. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 12 stores, 1 hotel, 3 boarding houses, 2 mills, 6 factories (cheese and butter), and 1 telegraph office. Pop. 507.

BAGUTCHEWAN, a river of Thunder Bay & Algoma districts, north-west Ontario, on the north shore of Lake Superior, joins the Keno-

gami River, 16 miles from Pembina Island. BAHNSEN, a station in Nipissing dist., Ont., on the C.P.R., 30 miles west of Sudbury, and 5 miles east of Cartier.

BAIE DE LA TRINITE, a fishing station and port on the north shore of the St. Law-rence, in Saguenay co., Que., about 240 miles below Quebec city. It is on the Trinity River, which is leased to sportsmen for salmon fishing. It has 1 Roman Catholic chapel, 2 stores, post office, and 2 telegraph offices. It is a port of call in summer for the steamers of the Que. & North Shore SS. line, at 10 day intervals. Pop., 3 families. 1½ miles from

Trinity Bay is the small settlement of Petit May, with a fishing population of 4 families. It is about 6 miles north-east of Point des Monts.

BAIE DES BACONS, a post office in Saguenay co., Que., via Tadousac, at the mouth of the Saguenay River. BAIE DES CHALEURS, Que. See Chaleurs,

Baie des.

BAIE DES PERES, a post village on Lake Temiscaming, Pontiac co., Que., 53 miles from Gordon Creek, and 110 miles from Mattawa Station. It contains 1 Roman Catholic church, 5 stores, 3 hotels, 1 saw mill and 1 grist mill. It is in the centre of a large farming country.

BAIE DES ROCHERS, or BAY OF ROCKS, a post village in Charlevoix co., Que., on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, near Murray Bay. Pop., about 100.

BAIE DES ROCHERS, a lake in the town-ship of Callieres, Charlevoix co., Que.

BAIE DES ROCHERS, a small river of Charlevoix co., Que., empties into the estuary of the St. Lawrence, 18 miles west of Tadousac. It is formed by a number of lakes in which trout are to be found.

BAIE ST. PAUL, a village of Quebec, cap-ital of the co. of Charlevoix, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, 60 miles below Quebec. It contains, besides the county, buildings, 1 Catholic church, 2 convents, sevgrist mills, about 30 stores, 3 hotels, 1 brick factory, 1 bank agency, and 1 telegraph office. There are iron and plumbago mines in the vicinity. Pop. of parish (1901), 2,519; of village, 1.408.

BAIE ST. PAUL, a post village in Macdonald co. Man., on the Assiniboine River, 4½ miles south of Marquette Station, on the C.P.R., 29 miles north-west of Winnipeg. Stock raising and root and grain growing are the chief industries. It has 2 churches (Roman Catholic and Presbyterian), 1 general store, and 1

It abounds with white trout, and is a great favorite for salmon and trout to spawn in. The sea shore on either side of its mouth is one of the best salmon fishing

It consists of a chain of lakes linked together by rapid streams, and is one of the largest and most important of the south-flowing streams of the island, draining an area of nearly 720 square miles of country. The following ponds or lakes form part of this river: Long Pond. 9 miles long and from 4 to 1 mile wide: Soulis Pond. area 31 square miles; Brazil Pond, area 23 square miles; Little Burnt Pond, area 2 square miles; Round Pond, a fine sheet of water elliptical in form. indented by numer-ous extensive bays and coves, and picturesous extensive bays and coves, and pictures-quely dotted over by many islands of various sizes, area, about 14 square miles: Pipe-stone Pond, area 1 square mile; Elnuchei-beehs-Gospen or Indian Sit Down Pond, area s square miles, and many others. The tri-butaries falling into the Bay East River are very numerous, and some of them are sufficiently large to admit a partial canoe navigaclently large to admit a partial cance naviga-tion, affording convenient communication to-wards the head waters of the streams which discharge themselves at various parts of the coast, both to the north and to the south. BAYER SETTLEMENT, on the Musquodoboit River, in Halifax co., N.S., 30 miles east of Halifax city. It has 3 churches (Episcopal,

Presbyterian and Methodist), 4 stores, 3 hotels, 6 saw mills, 1 lobster canning factory, besides post and telegraph offices. Pop. 600.

BAYFIELD, an incorporated post village in

BAYFIELD, an incorporated post village in Huron co., Ont., on the Bayfield River, 9 miles from Brucefield and Clinton Station. It contains Presbyterian and Methodist churches, and the Salvation Army Barracks, 10 stores, 3 hotels, grist and lumber (steam) mill, 1 savings bank, telegraph office. It is a summer rescrt-good fishing. Fop. (1901), 558. BAYFIELD, a vost village in Westmoreland co., N.B., on Northumberland Strait, 1½ miles from the terminus of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Ry. at Cape Tormen-tine. It contains Methodist church, 3 stores, 2 hotels, 2 grist mills, 1 saw mill. 1 carriage and several lobster canning factories, post of-fice, savings bank and telegraph and express fice, savings bank and telegraph and express offices. Farming is the principal industry. It is the winter port of the ice-boat service to P E.I. Pop. 500.

BAY FORTUNE, a post village in Kings co., P.E.I., 9 miles from Souris Station, on the Prince Edward Island Ry. It is an agricul-tural district and contains a Presbyterian church, 2 stores, 1 lobster factory and abundant

water-power. Pop. 75. BAY FORTUNE RIVER, a river of Kings co., P.E.I., narrow with a deep and crooked chan-, nel navigable for medium-sized vessels. A few salmon are caught in it, and quantities of trout and smelts.

BAYHAM, or RICHMOND VILLAGE, a post office in Elgin co., Ont., 4 miles from Corinth Station, on the G.T.R. (Air Line), 6 miles from Tillsonburg. It contains 1 Methodist church, 2 stores, hotel, grist mill, and telephone office, with banking facilities at Aylmer. Pop., chort 200

BAY LAKE, of Parry Sound district, Ont. BAY LAKE, an elongated sheet of water in Nipissing dist. N. Ont., north-east of the Temagami Forest Reserve, and west of Lake Temiskaming. The Montreal River flows through it, and it has water communication with Rib Lake, to the southward of it. The village of Latchford is on its east bank, and the line of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario RR. runs along the southern part of it towards Cobalt, Halleybury, and New Liskeard. Latch-ford is situate 94 miles north of North Bay, on Lake Nipissing, 226 miles north of Toronto,

over the North Bay div. of the G.T.R., and 234 miles north-west of Ottawa City, over the C.P.R.

BAY L'ARGENT, a small fishing settlement on the south east side of Fortune Bay, dist. of Fortune Bay, Nfld., 39 miles from Garnish. 209 Pon.

Pop. (1901), 209. BAYNES LAKE, a post office in Kootenay dist., B.C., a station on the Great Northern Ry., near the junction of the Elk and Koote-nay Rivers.

BAY OF BULLS, a post village and port of entry in the district of Ferryland, Nfld., on the Strait Shore, 19 miles from St. John's. It contains Roman Catholic and Anglican churches, 1 store, 5 small shops, a cod liver oil refinery, and 1 express office. Its fine harbor affords good shelter for vessels during storms. The people are chiefly engaged in the can-ning of fish. Pop. (1901), 832. BAY OF FUNDY. See Fundy, Bay of.

BAY OF ISLANDS, situated on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, 55 miles north from St. George's Bay, and on the western or treaty coast of Newfoundland, where the French until 1994 had concurrent right of fishing with the local population, but which now revert in full sovereignty to Newfoundland. The Bay is noted for its magnificent scenery, the en-trance, some fifteen miles wide, is studded with lofty islands. The Blomidon hills on the east reach a height of 1,500 feet. Several the east reach a height of 1,500 feet. Several arms of the sea branch from the Bay, the most important of which is Humber Sound, 28 miles in length, receiving at its head the Humber River, one of the most important in Newfoundland. The banks of the Sound are well timbered and some large mills do a fine business. Immense quantities of gypsum, limestone and marble are found in the vicinity, and there are indications of lead, copper and other minerals. Coal exists a few miles in from the Humber. The herring fishery is very valuable, and the soil ex-cellent. There is rallway connection with the east coast and with St. John's and Port-aux-Basques. A steamer calls fortnightly from St. John's and another from Halifax, N.S. Head and Corner Brook (population Birchy about 200 each), are the principal settlements of about 200 each), are the principal settlements of about 40 which the Bay contains; the former is a banking, post and telegraph office and port of entry under the name of Bay of Is-lands. Ry., is a port of entry and contains 2 Methodist, Anglican and Roman Catholic churches, 20 stores, 2 boarding houses, 2 saw mills, and issues a newspaper; telegraph and express offices. Pop. (1901) 2,226. BAY ST. GEORGE, a settlement in the dist. of St. George, Mfd., with port on Main Gut.

BAYSIDE, a post office in Northumberland co., N.B., near Bay du Vin, about 12 miles east of Chatham, on a branch of the I.C.R.

BAYSIDE, a post settlement in Halifax co., N.S., on the Nine Mile River, with port at Bayside, 18 miles from Halifax. It has 1 Baptist church, 1 store, 1 hotel, 2 steam saw mills and 1 shoe factory There is good moose shocting in the vicinity. Pop., 60.

BAYSVILLE, a post village and popular sum-BAYSVILLE, a post village and popular sum-mer resort in the district of Muskoka, Ont., on the south branch of the Muskoka River, 16½ miles from Bracebridge Station, on the G.T.R., and 27 miles from Gravenhurst. It contains 3 churches (Presbyterian, Episcopal and Roman Catholic), 2 hotels, 1 telegraph office, saw, shingle and grist mills and 3 stores. The land is free grant and lately

BEAR ISLAND, a post settlement in York co., N.B., on the St. John River, 12 miles from Harvey Station and 24 miles from Fredericton, on the C.P.R. It contains English, Roman Catholic and Baptist churches, 4 stores, 2 hotels, 1 saw and shingle mill, 1 chair factory, 1 sleigh and carriage factory. Pop., about 250.

BEAR ISLAND, or MCPHERSON'S FERRY, a post settlement in Richmond co., N.S., on the Strait of Canso, 51 miles from Point Tup-per, on the I.C.R. and Inverness & Richmond RR. The inhabitants engage in fishing. Pop., about, 150.

Atlantic RR.), of 5 miles from Seguin Falls, 33 miles west of Parry Sound, and 18 miles east of Scotia Jct. on the same line, and on the Toronto & North Bay div. of the G.T.R., 160 miles north of Toronto.

BEAR LAKE, in Temagami region, Nipissing dist., N. Ont., the waters of which, with those of Rabbit Lake to the southward, are drained by the Metabetchouan River into Lake Temis-

by the Aretabetendual raver into Lake remis-kaming, near the mouth of the Montreal River. BEAR LAKE, GREAT (i.e., the lake lying under the constellation of the Great Bear, being intersected from the Arctic-from Arctos, "bear,"-Circle-), a lake of the new Mackenzie district. Northwest Territories. be-tween lat. 65° and 67° N., and lon. 117° and 123° W. It lies southwest of Coronation Gulf in Franklin district. Shape very irregular; area may be estimated at 14.000 square miles; height above the sea at 230 feet. Its depth has never been ascertained; but, where tried, no bottom was found with 270 feet line. The water is remarkably transparent, and appears of a light blue color. The lake abounds with

fish. It discharges its waters by Bear River into the Mackenzie River, thence northward into Beaufort Sea. It remains frozen over from December to June.

BEAR RIVER, a post village in Digby co., N.S., beautifully situated at the head of navi-gation on Bear River and a station on the Dominion Atlantic Ry., 6 miles from Digby, 14 miles from Annapolis. It contains 1 tele-graph office, 1 telephone office, an iron foun-dry, 1 tannery, 12 saw mills, 2 grist mills, 2 threshing mills, several factories, 1 bank agency, 6 churches, 1 Salvation Army barracks, betele 90 others and accurate with mortic clar 2 hotels, 20 stores and several ship yards, also a large academy. It is a port of entry, and has an extensive trade in lumber, cordwood and grain.

BEAR'S HILL, a post settlement in Alberta Province. near Battle River, 5 miles from Wetaskiwin Station, on the Calgary & Edmon-ton branch of the C.P.R. It is a recently opened up district, being rapidly settled, chiefly from the Western States. It contains several stores.

BEARS PASS, a station on the Can. Northern RR, in Rainy River dist., Northwestern Ont., 66 miles west of Atikokan, and 78 miles east of Rainy River.

BEARS PASS, a settlement in Algoma dist., Ont., and a station on the Canadian Northern Ry. 24 miles east of Fort Francis.

BEASLEY, a station in Yale and Cariboo dist. B.C., on the Midway branch of the C.P. R., 7 miles from Nelson, and 5 miles from Slocan Jet.

BEAUDOIN, a post office in Megantic co., Que., 15 miles from Coleraine Station, on the Que. Central RR., 63 miles north of Sher-brooke and 4 miles from Thetford Mines,

BEAUFORT, a post office in Carleton co., N.B., on the south branch of the Miramichi River, 18 miles from Bristol, a station on the

River, 18 miles from Bristol, a station on the C.P.R., 26 miles north of Woodstock. Pop. 50. BEAUHARNOIS, a county in the S. W. ex-tremity of the Province of Quebec, bounded on the N. The glen is narrow, and its lofty sides, from the rugged channel to their greatest altitude, are lined with tree and shrub and brushwood; and the wooded heights stretch straight onand the woold defines stieter stagnt on-wards for some distance, then broaden out and bend to the right, ranging onwards as far as the eye can reach—the whole scene being one of singular grandeur and romantic beauty, reminding one forcibly of the rocky and woold doll that constitute to such and wooded dells that constitute to such a large extent the romantic scenery of Scotland. This lovely spot-called Eugenia Falls-is a great attraction to the lovers of the beautiful. This branch of the Beaver River affords an abundance of water-power available all the year round.

BIC ISLAND, or L'ISLET AU MASSACRE, an island on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, island on the south shore of the St. Lawrence, opposite the village of Bic, Que. It is about 3 miles long by 3 of a mile broad. A deed of blood marks the spot, and history furnishes the details of the scene. Some two centuries ago two hundred Micmac Indians were campago two hundred micrac indians were camp-ing there for the night: their cances had been beached, and a neighboring cavern offered an apparently secure asylum to the warriors, their wives and children. Wrapped in sleep, they quietly awaited the return of day to re-sume their journey. But during the still hours sume their journey. But during the start notice of night the Iroquois had compassed his slum-bering foe. Laden with birch bark faggots and other combustibles, the Iroquois silently surrounded the cave; the faggots were piled around it; the torch applied. The Micmacs, terror striken, seized their arms and prepared to rush through the flames and sell their lives as dearly as possible, but a shower of poisonas dearly as possible, but a shower of poison-ed arrows mowed them down, the tomahawk completed the scene, and history mentions but five out of the two hundred who escaped with their lives. The blanched bones of the warriors strewed the cave, and were seen by the Abbe Ferland some years ago. It has been the subject of an interesting legend by Mr. J. C. BIRNIE, a post office and station on the Can. Northern RR., in Dauphin co., Man., 10 miles from Carberry Jct., 16 miles north of Neepawa, 60 miles southeast of Dauphin and 157 miles northwest of Winnipeg. It is a fine agricultural district.

BIRR, a post village in Middlesex co., Ont., on the River Medway, 4 miles from Ilderton Station, on the G.T.R. (London & Wingham branch). It contains 3 churches (Methodist, Episcopal and Presbyterian), 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 lumber mill, and 1 cheese factory. Pop., about 200.

BIRSON, a post settlement in the Prov. of Baskatchewan, on the South Saskatchewan River, 15 miles from the C.P.R. station of Prince Albert, 90 miles north of Saskatcon. It has 1 Episcopal church and 1 general store. Pop. 150.

BIRTLE, a beautifully situated, progressive post town in Marquette co.. Man.. on the Birtle River, and a station in the Northwestern branch of the C.P.R., 57 miles west of Minne-

sections. BLACK STURGEON LAKE, on a river of the same name, in the district of Thunder Bay, northwestern Ontario, stretches in a north-westerly direction. It is about 13 miles in length by 2 wide, and comes within about 1 mile of the southern arm of Black Sturgeon Bay on Lake Nipigon. A valley, paved with rounded boulders extends from one to the other. Indians say that 35 years ago when-ever the water happened to be high, a small quantity flowed from Lake Nipigon into Black Sturgeon Lake. The water of Black Sturgeon Lake and River is very dark, while that of Lake Nipigon is remarkably clear. that of Lake Nipigon is remarkably clear.

black of Lake and River is very dark, while that of Lake Nipigon is remarkably clear. BLACK STURGEON, a river of Thunder Bay dist., northwestern Ontario, enters the north-ern extremity of Black Bay, in Lake Superior. The general upward course of this river sweens round in a regular curve from N. to N. W., and at the end of 44 miles reaches Black Sturgeon Lake. At 3 or 4 miles south-west of the point where it enters the lake it divides into 2 branches. At about 15 miles from the lake, the south branch enters a hilly country, and the north branch at about 13 miles; but east of this range the whole track through which the two branches pass is com-paratively level, and the country continues so to Black Sturgeon Lake and the lower section of the river. The upward course of the south fork of the river extends south-westward in two principal branches (each proceeding from lakes) to a distance of about 30 miles beyond a point at which it enters the hilly country, so that the whole course of the river is some 90 miles, but, following its windings, about double that distance. The Black Sturgeon is a rapid stream, and one of the largest rivers entering Lake Superior. In its course it passes through several lakes. entering Lake Superior. In its course it passes through several lakes.

BLACKVILLE, a thriving post settlement in Northumberland co., N.B., on the Miramichi River, and a station on the Canada Eastern River, and a station on the Canada Eastern Ry., 24 miles from Newcastle. Buffalo and Goderich branch of the G.T.R. and on the southern div. main line C.P.R. Brant-ford has agencies of the Bert ford has agencies of the Bank of Montreal, Bank of British North America, Canadian Bank of British North America, Canadian Bank of Commerce, Standard Bank of Canada, Bank of Toronto, Bank of Hamilton, and Imperial Bank of Canada and assurance and insurance companies, and contains 14 churches, 4 printing offices, from which 3 daily and 2 weekly newspapers are issued, 2 telegraph about 300 stores, and several firstoffices, class hotels. Among the manufactures of the city may be mentioned brass and iron castings, tin and japanned ware, sashes and blinds, engines and mill machinery, agricultural implements, and stoneware produced no-where else in the province. The celebrated Waterous Engine Works, Massey Harris Co., Ltd., Kerby Reaper Works, Verity Plough Co. and the Cockshutt Plough Co. give employment to a large number of men. The streets of Brantford are lighted with gas and electricity. The Grand Valley Electric Ry. has offices here and runs from this city to Galt. The city is justly celebrated for its public buildings, which are chiefly built of white brick. The court house and county buildings are situated in the centre of the city. They cost \$32,000. Among its churches, Grace church (Episcopa-lian), St. Basil's (Roman Catholic), Zion (Presbyterian) and the Methodist church on Brant avenue, are particularly remarkable as models of architectural excellence. Wickliffe Hall, erected by the Young Men's Christian Association in 1875, at a cost of \$22,000, is one

of the chief ornaments of the city. The Ontario Institution for the Education of the Blind occupies a prominent site just without Billing occupies a prominent site just without the limits of the city. It is built of white brick in the Tudor style, and possesses a frontage of 220 feet. The grounds include an area of 65 acres, which are in a high state of cultivation. BRITISH AMERICA, or the CANADIAN DOMINION, comprises, with the exception of Alaska, the whole of North America N. of parallel of 49°, together with some irregular portions, including New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, stretching south to lat. 43° 30′ N., and the triangular portion of which, Quebec and

Ontario, form the base, the apex extending S. to lat. 41° 56' N. This vast territory, an area of 3,745,574 sq. miles is bounded E. by the Atlantic, Davis' Strait and Baffin's Bay, the Atlantic, Davis' Strait and Baffin's Bay, N. by the Arctic seas embraced in the Frank-lin district, northwest by Alaska, west by the Pacific, and south by the United States. It comprehends the Provinces of Quebec, On-tario, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, including the Island of Cape Breton, Prince Edward Is-land, Newfoundland (a separate British colony, not a part of Canada), Manitoba, the new Pro-vinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta, British Columbia, Yukon, Mackenzle, Ungava, Frank-lin, and the Northwest Territories. The latter have of recent years been subdivided into provincial and partly organized districts as follows: Keewatin, Ungava, Franklin, Yukon provincial and partly organized districts as follows: Keewatin, Ungava, Franklin, Yukon and Mackenzie. Generally speaking British America is a level country. With the excep-tion of the Rocky Mountains on the W., the Laurentides on the north and the Notre Dame on the south of the St. Lawrence, it has but few elevations, and these are for the most part of inconsiderable height. The coast has purpower inductions the most remerkable part of inconsiderable height. The coast has numerous indentations, the most remarkable of which, on the east, are the Gulf of St. Law-rence and Hudson Bay. The latter, communi-cating with the Atlantic through Hudson and Frobisher straits, and with the Arctic ocean by means of Fox Channel, Gulf of Boothia, Prince Regent, and other inlets, penetrates to near the north centre of the continent, forming one of the most extensive inland seas on the globe. The surface of the country is extremely diversified with rivers and lakes. on the globe. The surface of the country is extremely diversified with rivers and lakes. The St. Lawrence, a river of immense volume, over 2,000 miles in length, forms the outlet of the great Canadian lakes. The Saskatchewan, rising in the Rocky Mountains, traverses 18° of lon., or a distance of at least 900 miles, and fails into Leke Winning to 55° N lat rising in the Rocky Mountains, traverses 18° of lon., or a distance of at least 900 miles, and fails into Lake Winnipeg, in 53° N. lat., area 3,536,000 acres. This lake is connected with Hudson Bay by the Nelson or Port Nel-son River, about 500 miles in length. Lake Athabaska, 1,818,880 acres, situated about lat. 58° N., and lon. 110° W., receives, among others, the Peace River and the Athabaska, a large stream, rising in the Rocky Mountains, near the source of the Columbia. The Mackenzie, entering Beaufort Sea in the Arctic Ocean, is one of the largest rivers on the globe. It flows through about 16° of lat. E. of the Mackenzie, entering and flowing into the Arctic ocean, are the Coppermine and Fish Rivers. The Yukon River, flowing through the district of that name, and thence through Alaska, is another very large river. The Yukon district is of great extent and has actively been explored. Since the discovery and exploitation of the mines of the Klondyke, it abounds in valu-able gold mines in the region of the Klondike, the objet settlement of which is head. able gold mines in the region of the Klondike, the chief settlement of which is known as Dawson City. The Yukon district has now an organization of its own, under a commissioner appointed by the Governor-General in council, with a small representation in the Dominion House of Commons.

The basin of the Winnipeg and the Saskatchewan may be considered as a continuation of that of the St. Lawrence, or as a portion of one high plateau divided into two parts. It is remarkable for its ranching and wheatraising capabilities due to its fine alluvial soil, and to the high range of sun heat in

summer, the ex-thermal lines here extending summer, the exthermal lines here extending far to the northward. The most northern sta-tion in which vegetation has been discovered is Melville Island,  $74^{\circ}$  50' N. lat., where the mean annual temperature is from 1 to 2 de-grees below zero, and that of July, about 42°. The species that exist here consist chiefly of saxifrages, grasses, cruciform plants, mosses, and lichens: not a tree or even a bush is able to rear its head; nor, indeed, is there a single (Salix arctica) which rises 6 inches high. It is (Salix arctica) which rises 6 inches high. It is in these latitudes that the red snow plant (*Protoccocus nivulis*), that most simple of cryptogamic vegetables, exists in all its beauty. As we advance southward, vast forests of spruce firs (*Abies alba* and *nigra*), among which grow the reindeer moss and other lichens, overspread the land. To those are added different kinds of wild currants and herein and a variety of well currants and lear berries, and a variety of papilionaceous plants, which abound, in the open plains. With these are combined, as we continue to advance, the majestic poplars of Canada (Populus hudso-nica, and others), birches (Betula papyracea and populiolia), and many sorts of caks and ashes together with butternuts (Juglans Cenerea) and hickories (Carya alba and amara). The animals hunted for food are of four different kinds, deer, buffaloes, rabbits and por-cupines. Wild fowl are also numerous especially grouse wild geese, and ducks. The principal ly grouse while geese, and ducks. The principal objects of traffic, especially in the most north-ern parts, are the skins of fur-clad animals, of which there are here a great variety. The chief tribes inhabiting the Northern regions are the Chippewas, the Assintbolnes, the Crees, the Slave Indians, and the Esquimaux. Of all these tribes the Crees have the best character, hear active benest and besuitable kind to being active, honest, and hospitable, kind to their women, and fondly attached to their children. For an account of that portion of British America under cultivation see CANADA,

British Alments and the sense 1871 a province of the Dominion of Canada, on the Pacific, bounded on the north by the 60th parallel of latitude which separates the Province from the Yukon district; east by the main chain of the Rocky Mountains and the western boundaries of Alberta Province; south by the United States and the 49th parallel; and west by the Pacific Ocean and Queen Charlotte's Sound. On the northwest lies the United States and the 49th parallel; and west by the Columbia has long been in dispute. The dimensions of British Columbia are: Length 7644 miles; breadth about 400 miles. Area 372,630 square miles. The coast line is deeply indented. The northern part of the Province is diversified with mountain, lake and fruits in larger measure than any part of even Ontario, and with a mining region (Omineca) at the head waters of the Peace, Skeena and Fraser Rivers, which, though very imperfectly explored (owing to their inaccessibility to general travel), gives indications of beling very rich in gold and silver. The southern and middle part includes the rich gold valley of the Fraser River, and is well adapted for pasturage, and also, with irrigation, for agriculture; some parts, however,

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such as the Chilcotin plains, and the great and beautiful valley of the Okanagon, require no artificial irrigation, nor does any part of the seaboard. Throughout the whole extent of the Province there is an abundance of forest land, the timber on which is of the most valuable description. One kind especially, the Douglas fir, is celebrated for its length and straightness and has squared 43 inches for a length of 90 feet. The tree is very often from 150 to 300 feet in length, without knots or branches, and the diameter varies from 6 to 10 feet, and in quality is about twice as strong as Canadian red pine, and, being more gum-10 reet, and in quanty is about twice as strong as Canadian red pine, and, being more gum-my, is more durable and takes a better hold. At Burrard Inlet, 9 miles from New West-minster, there are pine trees 27 to 30 feet in diameter. Timber limits can be leased from the Government at a nominal rate per acre per annum, with a rebate of 25 cents per thousand exported out of the province is the royalty. The total exports of British Columbia for the year 1903 amounted in value to \$15,604,896, while the value of the imports for the year was \$11,141,068.

was \$11,141,068. The mineral resources of British Columbia are very great. Gold is found all along the Fraser and Thompson Rivers, and in great abundance in the Cariboo district, the yield in that one locality exceeding, in a single year, one million dollars, while the yield of the entire Province, from 1862 to 1903, was \$84,510,640. The gold yield for the past three years (1901-2-3) exceeded in value \$17,000,000. That of the Yukon district amounted in value, 10,103 to \$12,250,000 The quantity and yalua That of the Yukon district amounted in value, in 1903, to \$12,250,000. The quantity and value of silver produced in British Columbia for the years 1901 and 1902 was as follows: 1901, 5,151,-333 ounces, of the value of \$3,036,711; 1902, quantity: 3,917,917 oz.; value \$2,043,586. The production of lead (1901) was over 514 million pounds, valued at \$2,235,603. Much of the wealth of the Province, how-ever, is its coal fields, which are re-puted to be inexhaustible, easy of access and easily worked Bituminous coal is found and easily worked. Bituminous coal is found on the mainland, and on Vancouver Island; and anthracite coal on Queen Charlotte Island. Nanaimo coal fields cover two hundred square Nanaimo coal fields cover two hundred square miles; those of Comax, seven hundred, each mile of which is computed to yield 16,000,000 tons. The value of the coal production of the Pacific Coast Province has in the past three years exceeded four million dollars per year. In an article on "Mineral Wealth," Prof. Daw-son, C.M.G., F.R.S., says: "Everything which has been ascertained of the geological charac-ter of the Province as a whole tends to the ter of the Province as a whole tends to the ter of the Province as a whole tends to the bellef that, so soon as means of travel and transport shall be extended to what are still the more inaccessible districts, these also will be discovered to be equally rich in minerals, particularly in the precious metals, gold and silver." The fisheries which are proving a source of national wealth are amongst the most valuable known and over 65500 men are amongst source of national wealth are amongst the most valuable known, and over 65,500 men are em-ployed in the fisheries proper, to say nothing of the shore hands. The yield value of the British Columbia fisheries was for 1901 \$7,492,-771, and for 1902 \$5,234,824. The annual seal catch in the Province has of recent years varied from 5,000 to 10,000 seals. Of British Columbia salmon, the catch for the years 1901, 1902 and 1903 has filled over 2,300,000 cases, chiefly from the Fraser and the Skeena

rivers. The value of the Provincial salmon catch for the year 1902 was \$3,753,892. The climate of British Columbia is mild and favor-able enough to allow animals to live in the able enough to allow animals to live in the open air throughout the winter, and in many parts the plains and hills are covered with a herb called bunch grass, which possesses highly nutritious qualities and keeps cattle in highly nutritious quanties and support of the whole winter. excellent condition during the whole winter, but Winter lasts from November till March; but snow seldom remains long on the ground. The prevailing winds are from the north in summer, and from the south and west in winter.

ter. The land fit for agricultural settlement is diversified by hill and dale, and watered by numerous streams and lakes. The soil varies from a deep black vegetable loam to a light brown, loamy earth, the hills supplying slate and building stone. Wheat, barley, potatoes, turnips, apples, pears, etc., grow luxuriantly. The country is rich in fur-bearing animals, of which the principal are the black, brown and grizzly bears, lynx, marten and beaver. Shipbuilding is a branch of trade which pro-mises to assume large proportions. Manufactures, though yet in their infancy, are steadily increasing. The value of the entire exports of B.C., for the year ending June 30, 1903, was \$15,604,896. Chief among the rivers of the country is the great Fraser River, which pursues a rapid course between steep and rocky banks, until, approaching the sea, it presents a fertile and finely wooded valley from 50 to 60 miles in length. The total length of the Fraser River is about 700 miles. The Thompson River sur-passes the Fraser in the richness of its scenery, and flows through one of the most beautiful countries in the world. The Colum-bia is another noble stream. It enters the United States at Fort Shepherd, after a course of nearly 800 miles in British territory. Total length about 1,200 miles.

The means of communication with the in-terior of British Columbia are very good. Steamers ascend the Fraser River over 100 miles, to the head of navigation, and for over 450 miles beyond this there is an excellent gravelled road, constructed by the Government at great expense. Burrard Inlet is the largest and finest harbor on the mainland Van-

gravelled road, constructed by the Government at great expense. Burrard Inlet is the largest and finest harbor on the mainland. Van-couver, which twenty-five years ago was hard-ly known, is now the first city in the Pro-vince, with a population of 26,133 at the 1901 census; to-day it is about 45,000; it is the terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Steamers belonging to the same company con-nect that city with Victoria. British Columbia consists of two perfectly distinct parts, the mainland above described and Vancouver Island. This island is the largest in the Pacific, being 278 miles long, and 40 to 50 wide. It is separated from the mainland by the Strait of Juan de Fuca, which is about 16 miles in width, and by the Strait of Georgia, which varies from 30 miles in width to a narrowness that is bridgeable, viz.: at Valdes' island, Queen Charlotte's Sound which separates B. C. from Vancouver Island on the north. The surface is marked by mountain ranges and extensive plains The soil is productive. The island is noted for its coal mines. Gold has also been found. The harbors are numerous and excellent. At The harbors are numerous and excellent. At

Esquimalt until recently was located here, the Imperial naval dockyard and arsenal, with extensive fortifications.

The public affairs of British Columbia are The public analys of British Columbia are administered by a Lieutenant-Governor, an Executive Council of five members, and a Legislative Assembly composed of 42 represen-tatives elected every four years. The Pro-vince, which entered Confederation in 1871, is represented in the Dominion Parliament by seven members in the House of Commons and brace Constore Luctice is discussed by a three Senators. Justice is dispensed by a chief justice and four assistants.

Education is free to all; the schools are nonsectarian. In 1903 there were in the Province, 273 common schools 65 graded and 8 high schools with a combined teaching staff of 607,

and an average attendance of 16,627 pupils. Victoria, Vancouver Island, is the capital of the Province, and the seat of the see of the Lord Bishop of British Columbia. It is situ-ated on a narrow inlet, which, completely landlocked, gives accommodation to all vessels landiocked, gives accommodation to all vessels whose draught of water does not exceed 18 feet. It is rapidly rising into a considerable city, the last (1901) census showing a popula-tion of 20,816. New Westminster, in 1901, had a population of 6,499. The other towns of note a population of 0,499. The other towns of noise in the Province embrake Yale, Lytton, Kam-loops, Nanaimo and Hope. At Vancouver is situated Stanley Park, an attractive and im-pressive forest reservation on the point which separates the harbor from the Strait of Georgia. It is about 950 acres in extent and is encircled by a driveway ten miles in length.

length. British Columbia occupies a commanding position not only with regard to the trade of the western part of America and the Pacific islands, but also with respect to China, Japan, and other Asiatic countries, and the Austra-lian colonies. Along the whole coast line of at least 7,000 miles (following indents) a per-fect labyrinth of islands exists, giving innu-merable harbors, inlets and channels, teem-ing, as well as the rivers that empty into them, with salmon, sturgeon, mackerel, cod, herrine, halbut, oulachans and whales. Exherring, halibut, oulachans and whales. Ex-cept the whale fishery, these vast fisheries are altogether undeveloped.

This colony was first established in 1858; it This control into the Canadian Confederation in 1871, and has since made remarkable pro-gress. The total population in 1871 was 32,247 exclusive of Indians. This total comprised 8,576 whites, 462 negroes, and 1,548 Chinese. The number of Indians is suprosed to be about 30,000. The population (1901) numbers about 178,657. The construction of the Canadian Paci-173,657. The construction of the Canadian Paci-fic Railway has developed the magnificent re-sources of the Province, and adds greatly to the wealth and general prosperity of the Do-mindon. The distance from Montreal to Vic-toria is 2,984 miles, which can now be ac-complished in five days. The revenue of the Province, for the year anding 30th June 1903 was \$2,044.633 while

ending 30th June, 1903, was \$2,044,653, while the expenditure was \$3,593,182, the chief items in the latter being the disbursements on public works, education, civil government, and interest on the public debt. An authority has this to say as to the fer-tility of Northern British Columbia:

"At Fort St. James, about lat. 54° 30' N., 2,000 feet above the sea, the first barley (five

The grass, barley, and vegetable area north of the above-that is, from lat. 55° to 60° N., northern boundary line of British Colum-bia), and from lon. 120° W. to American boun-dary, 14° W., is estimated at 100,000 square miles, or 64,000,000 acres. A considerable por-tion, say one-sixth of these areas, is covered with lakes, which like all the rivers, abound with wholesome fish-fish, in fact, is the native with wholesome fish-fish, in fact, is the native staple food.

Staple food. The coast line of British Columbia is es-timated at 10,000 miles, a predicate on that of Norway the latter, on actual measurement, having been found to have in its indented line thirteen times the length of its coast in a straight line. In point of fact, the British Columbia coast is much more indented and more deeply so than that of Norway, some of the inlets running in upwards of fifty miles. The inlets are full of salmon and other fish. The census of 1901 gives the religions of the weaple of the Province of colours.

BRITISH COLUMBIA, LAKES OF. There are many hundreds of lakes in British Columbia, varying in dimensions from 70 miles in length by 4 or 5 miles in breadth to the mere moun-tain tarn of a few acres in extent, and gen-erally abounding with fine fish. Of the prin-cipal lakes the following may be mentioned: Horse Lake and Lac des Rochers on the the great Okanagan Lake and the Osooyoos, North Branch. On the Columbia water-shed the Arrow Lakes, the Great Lake of the Arcs-plattes on the Kootenay Branch. On the waters of Peace River, McLeod's Lake, etc. Close to Stuart's Lake is Nata-punket or Close to Stuart's Lake is Nata-punket or Babine Lake, a sheet of water of the first magnitude heading a branch of the Skeena; and on a tributary of the same stream flow-ing from the porthward is Concellur's Lake ing from the northward is Conolly's Lake, on both of which are posts of the Hudson Bay Company. BRITISH COLUMBIA (the chief RIVERS OF) "The unique position of British Columbia as a watershed on the Pacific Coast of America," says an official bulletin of the Province, "will at once be recognized when it is seen that all the rivers of great importance on that coast, with the exception of one (the Colo-rado), arise from within its boundaries. The drainage of its extensive area of mountains and highlands is received into the numerous lakes which have been noticed as forming so

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striking a feature of the interior. Thence the surplus is discharged into the few large rivers or their many tributaries, which finally reach the sea. These rivers are the Columbia on the south (debouching through American terthe south (decoulding through American ter-ritory into the Pacific Ocean); the Fraser (750 miles long), the Skeena (300 miles), and the Stikine, on the west; the Liard (over 300 miles in British Columbia), on the north; and the Peace River (over 300 miles in British Columbia), on the east. These rivers are of great size and volume, and the first four are sufficiently navigable to steamers to form sufficiently navigable to steamers to form waterways of no small value in the develop-ment of the country." To the above list has to be added the Kocienay, and the two branches (N. & S.) of the Thompson. The latter two branches come together at Kam-loops, and after flowing through Kamloops Lake the combined stream empties into the Fraser River at Lytton. Economically speaking, it may be said that the most useful river, the great watercourse of the Province, is the Fraser, See British Columbia, Lakes of.

granh office. BUTLER. a post settlement in Haliburton co., Ont., 8 miles from Kinmount Station on Northern division of the G.T.R. Its port is Burnt River. BUTTERNUT RIDGE, a post settlement in Kings co., N.B., 12 miles from Petitcodiac, on the I.C.R. and Elgin & Havelock lines. It has 5 churches, saw and grist mills, and several stores. Pop., about 500. BUTTER POTS, two remarkable hills in New-foundiand. They are upwards of 1000 feet high, 20 miles apart, and form the extremities of a range of hills. BUTTERTON, a post office in Assa. West dist., Prov. of Saskatchewan, 74 miles from Earl Grey Station, on the Pheasant Hills branch of the C.P.R. BUTTON HOLE COVE. a settlement

branch of the C.P.K. BUITON HOLE COVE, a settlement in the dist. of Twillingate, Nfid. Pop. (1901), 20. BUITONVILLE, a post settlement in York co., Onthe Rough River, 3½ miles from Unionville Station, on the G.T.R. 3 miles from Markham. It contains Methodist, Presbyte-rian and Lutheran churches, 2 stores, 1 hotel,

and 1 grist mill. Pop., about 200. BUTTS POINT, a station on the Reid-Nfid. Ry., 61 miles west of Clarenville.

BUXTON, a post settlement in Kent co., Ont., a station on the Michigan Central Ry., 12 miles south of Chatham. It contains 1 Presbyterian church, 1 hotel, 1 general store, and church of the store.

Presbyterian church, 1 notel, 1 general store, and telegraph and express offices. Pop. 100. BVNG. a post village on the Grand River in Haldimand co., Ont., 1 mile from Dunville, on the G.T.R. (Buffalo & Goderich branch), the nearest banking town. It contains 1 church, 1 school and 1 flour mill. Pop., under 250.

BYNG INLET, a post village in the Parry Sound district, Ont. at the mouth of the Mag-netawan River on the north shore of Georgian Bay, 100 miles from Collingwood, and 50 miles from Parry Sound. A steamer from Colling-wood calls here every week. It has 2 churches

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(Roman Catholic and Presbyterian), 3 stores, 1 temperance hotel, 1 saw mill, and 1 box factory, besides telegraph and express office. Pop. fluctuating, average about 650. BYRNEDALE, a post settlement in Essex co., 51 miles from Belle River on the Great

co., 53 miles from Belle River on the Great Western division of the G.T.R. Pop. 200. BYRON, a post village in Middlesex co., Ont., on the River Thames, 5 miles from Hyde Park Station, terminus of Springbank Line, London Electric Railway. It has good water-power privileges and contains 1 flour mill, 2 stores, 2 churches and 1 telephone office. The largest single span steel bridge in the Province is in course of erection here. Pop. 100. BYRON BAY, on the east coast of Labrador, lat. 50° 40′ north, long. 50° 30′ west. It is near

Hamilton Inlet. BYRON ISLAND, an island on the east coast of Labrador, in lat. 54° 40′ north, long. 57° 30′ west.

CABANE RONDE, a station on the Quebec branch C.P.R., 30 miles north east of Montreal. Pop. 30.

CABANO, a post settlement in Temiscouata o., Que., on the lake of that name, 1 mile co., Que., Fort Ingalls, on the Temiscouata Ry. from

from Fort Ingalls, on the Temiscouata Hy. It contains 10 stores, 4 hotels, 4 flour mills, 1 saw mill and 1 express office. Pop. 750. CABISTACHUAN, a large bay on the east side of Lake Mistassini, in Ungava dist. N. E.T., about 20 miles in depth. At its south end a stream of the same name, said to be of considerable size, enters from the eastward. The lake lies on the north side of the height of land which sequerates Ungava district from of land which separates Ungava district from the Province of Quebec.

CABLE HEAD, a post settlement in Kings co., P.E.I., near St. Peters, a station on the Souris branch of the P.E.I. railway.

CABLE HEAD WEST, a post settlement on the Gulf of St. Lawrence, in Kings co., P.E.I., 3 miles from St. Peters at the head of St. Peters Bay, and a station on the Prince Edward Island RR. (Souris branch), 39 miles northeast of Charlottetown. It has 2 churches (Presbyterian and Baptist), 1 saw mill and 3 lobster canning factories. There are no stores, as the shopping is done at St. Peters. Pop. 110. CABOT'S HEAD, the extreme point of a uro-

CABOT'S HEAD, the extreme point of a promontory separating Lake Huron from Georgian Bay. It lies northwest of Owen Sound, in Grey Bay. It lies co., Ontario.

CACHE, a small post office and flag station on the C.P.R. in Algoma dist, Ont. Pop. 10. CACHE, one of a small group of lakes in Nipissing district, northwest Ont.

CACHE, a lake in Chicoutimi co., Que. CACHE BAY, an incorporated post village in Nipissing co., Ont., on Lake Nipissing, and a station on the C.P.R. It contains 3 churches (Presbyterian, Anglican and Methodist), 5 stores, 3 lumber mills, 1 bank and telegraph and express offices. It is an important lumber centre, being headquarters of the lumber branch of Davidson. Hay & Co., of Toronto, and the Sturgeon River branch of J. R. Booth. About 800 men in the trade camp annually in the vicinity. Pop. 800.

CACHE CREEK, a post office in Yale dist., B.C., 6 miles from Ashcroft Station, on the C. P.R., north of Lytton and west of Kamloops.

CACHE CREEK VALLEY, in the electoral district of Yale, B.C., is situated on the Cariboo Road, 6 miles from Ashcroft, on the C.P.R.

There is a post office at Cache Creek. The dis-trict is almost entirely devoted to agricul-ture, some of the best farms in the province being found here.

CACHE LAKE. a small post office and flag station on the C.P.R., in Thunder Bay district.

orthwest Ont. Pop. 10. OACHE LAKE, in Nipissing dist., Ont, near the entrance to Algonquin National Park and close to the line of the Ottawa and Parry Sound branch of the G.T.R.

CACHE LAKE, in Badgerow t'p., dist. of Ni-rissing. N. Ont., lying south of the Sturgeon River and to the northwest of Cache Bay sta-tion on the C.P.R., on an inlet of Lake Nipissing.

CACHEE RIVER, rises near the southwest corner of Lanaudiere, in Maskinonge co., Que., and joins the Little Maskinonge in Dusable.

CACHEE RIVER, rises in Terrebonne co., Que., and running south falls into the River Jesus.

CACOUNA, the Brighton of Canada, a beautiful summer resort and an incorporated town in Temiscouata co., Que., on the St. Lawrence. which is 20 miles wide at this boilt. Lawrence, from Cacouna Station on the I.C.R. It contains 3 churches (Roman Catholic, Preebyterian and Anglican), 12 stores, 8 hotels, butter and cheese factories, newspaper, telegraph and express of-Pop. 2,880. fices

CACOUNA. SOUTH, a notable watering place on the St. Lawrence River. in Temiscouata co.. Que., with river port at Riviere du Loup, and Que, with river work at Riviere du Louis, and a station, 24 miles distant (Cacouna), on the Intercolonial RR. In summer, it is a fashion-able resork, "the Newport," as it has been called. of Canada. It has 3 churches (I Roman Catholic and 2 Protestant), 10 stores. 10 hotels, in the store of the store o 3 lumber and flour mills, and 1 butter fac-tory. At the Carouna Club there are express and telegraph offices Pop 3000

CADERETTE, a post office in Springer townshin. Nipissing dist., north-west Ontario. It is reached by way of Sturgeon Falls Station, on the C.P.R., 24 miles west of North Bay on Lake Ninissing

CADMUS, a post settlement in Durham co.. Ont. 6 miles from Burketon Jct., on the C.P.R., 23 miles from Lindsay. It contains 2

churches (Presbyterian and Methodist), 1 store post office and 1 flour mill. Pop., about 60. CADOT, a post village in Monteelm co. One, and, a station on the Canadian Northern Guebec RR. It has I Roman Catholic church and elementary school, 1 general store, saw and grist mills, 1 butter factory, 1 carriage factory and 1 blacksmith shop. Pop. 150.

CADWAILADAR, a post office in Yale dist., B.C., near Ashcroft, on the main line of the C.P.R., 203 miles north-east of Vancouver.

CÆSEREA, a post office on Lake Sougoz, Durham co., Ont., 8 miles from Port Perry and 6 miles from Burketon Jct., a station on the C.P.P. 23 miles from Lindsay. It contains 2 churches, 2 stores, 1 hotel, 1 flour mill and 1 shingle mill. Pon., about 150

CAHILLS. a station on the Woodstock branch C.P.R. in York co., N.B., 28 miles from Wood-stock. 57 miles from Fredericton.

CAHILTY, a post office in Vale dist., B.C., 35 miles from Kamloops, a station on the C P. R. (main line) between Ashcroft and Sicamous Jct., and 250 miles north-east of Vancouver.
